PASTOR'S PEACE

Can you believe it? Our Protestant Churches are almost 500 years old! Our birthday arrives at the end of October, coinciding with All Saints' Day (the day following Halloween) when Martin Luther pounded 99 complaints or objections to then-current church practices to the door of the Wittenberg Cathedral in Germany where everybody could read them. Luther set in motion a revolution of sorts that grew beyond anything he ever anticipated. It spawned dozens, if not hundreds, of different Christian communions, each claiming to best embody the way of Christ. For years, being a Protestant was a big thing. Those were days when it seemed so important to make absolutely clear that we weren't Roman Catholic. Many people were even averse to using the word "Catholic" in reciting the Apostles' Creed—better to translate it as "universal." Now, however, our Protestant identity is becoming vaguer and vaguer. Folks aren't even sure what it means to be Protestant anymore--or whether it matters. Poor Martin Luther: surely he would be rolling over in his grave if he knew how Protestant-illiterate we have generally become.

I don't want to go back to that time when Roman Catholics and Protestants regarded each other as adversaries. But our Protestantism remains a great tradition to honor and uphold. This coming month at St. Paul we're going to be doing exactly that—both recalling what made the Protestant Reformation so important and the many ways it continues to be so very relevant in our times. See you in church!

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION EDITORIAL

As Christian Education prepares to begin a new year and as the young people look to a new school year loaded with extra-curricular activity, I believe the following reprint is justified. In a world full of uncertainty and constant change let us instill within our young people the truth of their unchanging, ever-loving God.

While most churches throughout the nation struggle to find ways to maintain the attendance of their young people, research continues to validate the importance of building a strong foundation of faith in their lives; one that begins at an early age.

Research concludes that faith that is rooted in early childhood and watered consistently throughout the teenage years serves to keep young people from experiencing an "identity crisis" when older.

Sociologist Tim Clydesdale interviewed 125 students as they transitioned from high school to college. He discovered that most college freshmen are overwhelmed by what he called "daily life management." They struggle to juggle and maintain their school and social networks (friends, romantic partners, authority figures). Rather than dive into figuring out who they are, students store away important fragments of who they were (often including, but not limited to, their religious and spiritual identities) in an "identity lockbox" when they enter college. For those who embrace the lockbox approach, college life is simply a series of disconnected events – without connection to one's true self and without regard to previous commitments, including faith.

Similarly, studies acknowledged that some students put their faith on hold when they enter college so they can "enjoy college life." Translated, that means *party*. When asked about shelving their faith, a couple students acknowledged the inconsistency of it all.

There are many pitfalls to a lockbox approach to faith during the adolescent and college years. One, when students put their faith on hold, they are easily pushed by the shifting winds of their peer culture. Secondly, when students set aside their faith for a time, it affects the quality of their integrated thinking. They struggle at best to make true-to-self decisions about their worldviews, romantic partners and career directions if they've placed their faith on hold. Lastly, there's the issue of what happens when students finally bust open those lockboxes and take a serious look at who they are, either some time later in college or perhaps after in their adult years. Many will face deep regret about the decisions they've made (Sticky Faith, Powell, Griffin, Crawford).

Research after research speaks to the importance of rearing a child in faith and to the need of doing it consistently. When the acts of faith become as natural to a child and young person as getting dressed each day, it becomes a part of who they are versus a fragment of their identity.

May we work together to give each young person a strong foundation on which to build his/her identity in Christ.

St. Paul Congregation Prepares for Annual ChristNet Week

Our St. Paul congregation will be providing emergency overnight housing as part of our annual participation in the ChristNet Homeless Shelter during October 15-22. Up to thirty men and women could be staying with us on mattresses spread out over Fellowship Hall. Additionally, our congregation will be offering our ChristNet guests breakfast and supper, as well as a brown bag lunch to go. The guests are expected to arrive at 6:30 every evening and depart at 7:00 a.m. the following morning throughout the week. Fellowship Hall will be divided with separate sleeping areas for men and women with space also set aside for a dining area. The shower stall in the downstairs lavatory, first installed back in the 1950s when our church had powerhouse basketball teams, will be recommissioned for use by our guests.

Both volunteers and supplies are needed to help host ChristNet week. Men and women of the congregation are invited to sign up to serve as hosts for half a night, or assist with Sunday morning clean-up, the Sunday afternoon laundering of linens, and the transport of bedding and supplies to the next host church. Overnight hosts have a choice of early or late shifts, 5:30 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. or 12 midnight to 6:00 a.m.

Donations of breakfast cereals (Cheerios, Frosted Flakes, Fruit Loops, Instant Oatmeal packets) are welcome. So are certain travel size personal care and clothing items—namely shaving cream, women's deodorant, chapstick, alcohol-free mouthwash, and men's tee-shirts and boxers (large and extra-large only). Equally helpful, you can also make a financial contribution to our congregation's ChristNet week that will help defray the costs of any remaining items that need to be purchased to meet our guests' needs.

Our ChristNet week is once again being coordinated by a team that includes Kim Martinez, Dee Salsbury, and Pastor Geoff Drutchas. 'Grand Inquisitor' Book Discussion All Set

It's a very short book with a big punch. That's the way that Fyodor Dostoyevsky's "The Grand Inquisitor," a novel within a novel, has been described. And it will be the focus of a Sunday evening book discussion on October 22, 7-8:30 p.m.

Regarded as one of Russia's two finest nineteenth century authors, Dostoyevsky wrote "The Grand Inquisitor" as a chapter in his very long novel "The Brothers Karamazov." Yet ever since publication, "The Grand Inquisitor" has been read as a stand-alone work of art. The provocative story-line speculates on what Jesus might have said and done if he had returned to earth in the middle of the Spanish Inquisition of the 1500s only to be confronted by the Grand Inquisitor. The story and its message is as relevant in 2017 as it was when Dostoyevsky first wrote it more than a hundred years ago.

The book discussion will meet in the church parlor. Copies of "The Grand Inquisitor" will be available for pick-up to all interested participants in the church office two weeks in advance. Nemo's allows individual checks but does not take credit cards. Tour participants should plan accordingly.

But the rotational night time program hosted by churches will continue even after the move to the new building sometime in 2017.
