PASTOR'S PEACE

Over the past several weeks our congregation has been worshipping indoors again. Our Indian Summer has been spectacular. I can't remember when fall colors were as gorgeous. Yet even when days warmed up, mornings remained chilly. The temperature for worship is definitely better indoors. However, with our move indoors for worship we've had to redouble our efforts to make sure that we stay safe and mutually protect everyone's health and well-being. Masking and social distancing is asked of everyone joining for sanctuary worship.

To help us with all this, a volunteer safety team of church members months ago assessed our sanctuary and put together guidelines, literally and figuratively. Thanks to the team's handiwork, the sanctuary has been thoughtfully taped off so that worshipers are directed to every second pew. On the sanctuary floor too there are taped arrows and lines for safest traffic flow and proper spacing for social distancing. Actually, it's pretty artfully done and even a little festive and decorative. The only problem I have is the fact that our safety team must have been predominantly Wolverine, rather than Spartan fans: The tape everywhere is maize and blue!

Everyone worshiping needs to follow these taped "guidelines," as well as simple directions provided by our presiding deacons and ushers. For instance, to support social distancing those arriving for worship are called up to take the next available pew up front, as opposed to exercising personal preference as we have been accustomed to do. This makes it easier and safer to seat the next arrivals. Although folks from the same household may be seated together, we ask all others to maintain at least six feet distance in the same pew. At the end of the service, ushers will come forth to dismiss each pew, back to front of the sanctuary—this again to minimize close person-to-person contact. Both before and after the service it's important for us not to linger in the aisles, narthex, or vestibule for conversation. Better to wave to each other from our pews or to talk—still keeping our distance—outdoors. A couple of weeks back, I caught myself stepping into the sanctuary before the service to talk from the center aisle with worshipers already in the pews. That wasn't a good idea—or a good example. Now, after the Sunday morning service, I head around our building to the front of our church where I look forward to greeting people informally, individually, and safely.

Here and there, I hear about some churches opening up worship and activities without much, if any, precautions, in reckless disregard of what we know about Covid-19. Small surprise then that some big Covid-19 outbreaks in Michigan have very recently occurred as a result of folks congregating for church services. Such outbreaks are only likely to increase as our nation, state, and local communities face a new wave of viral spread.

As Christians, we are each called to be good stewards of everything God bestows, including our own lives and the lives of those around us. With this in heart and mind, we need to be courageous, not careless. We bring dishonor to God and shame to the church when we, acting morally irresponsible, allow worship services to become "super-spreader" events.

I count myself blessed to be a part of a congregation with lay leadership committed to providing a good moral example in the way that we as a people of faith respond to the very real dangers of Covid-19. My hope is that we can continue to show others how we can navigate this difficult and challenging time both worship-fully and safely. See you in church--and on Facebook.

Totenfest Service Remembers Family Members and Friends

Church members who have passed away over the last twelve months are being remembered at the Totenfest Service on Sunday, November 1. As their names are read aloud near the end of the service, our 1911 church bell will be rung to honor each deceased member. In keeping with custom, a special liturgy based upon the words of the Apostle Paul will also be offered as a part of the morning service 10 a.m. Prior to the start of the service, an altar candle will be lit for each church member and friend being memorialized during morning worship. Also, a large separate candle will be lit with the accompanying candles memorializing all who have lost their lives due to the coronavirus.

Memorial Sunday always immediately follows All Hallows' Eve (Halloween), All Hallows' or All Saints Day, and All Souls' Day—three back-to-back occasions in the historic calendar of the church in which those who have died are remembered and celebrated.

Communion Sacrament Offered During Memorial Sunday Service

The communion sacrament will be offered during the Totenfest or Memorial Sunday Service, November 1. As church members and friends arrive, the deacons and ushers will provide individually wrapped wafer-and-cup communion 'kits' to be opened later in the service after the customary prayer of consecration. Those participating in the Sunday morning service via Facebook are encouraged to make use of bread and grape juice from their home kitchen which will also be consecrated by Pastors Geoff Drutchas and Cheryl Schalm as communion begins.

At St. Paul United Church of Christ we observe an "open communion" which means that formal membership in our church is not required to share in the sacrament. We welcome all confirmed in faith or of adult age to the sacred meal that Jesus began in an upper Jerusalem room with his apostles before facing Calvary's cross.

Tuesday Morning Bible Study Reading Paul's Letter to the Romans

After completing the four gospels and the Book of Acts of the Apostles over the last the last year, the Tuesday class has turned to the New Testament epistles, beginning with the Apostle Paul's Letter to the Romans, emphasizing the message of salvation by grace rather than deeds. The reading of the present epistle is likely to take class through December. Pastor Geoff Drutchas provides a hand-out for each class with participants optionally sharing in an out-loud reading of scripture.

The class will also be telephonically "meeting" every second Thursday for a brief time of prayer and socialization, which is especially important for those not able to attend a particular class.

A New ChristNet Season Launched

ChristNet Homeless Services and the Wayne Metropolitan Action Agency are partnering to ensure that the homeless individuals and families have refuge from the streets and cold this fall and winter. The shelter program opened its doors during the third week in October. However, due to the closure or partial opening only of so many churches across the Downriver area in the face of continuing pandemic, ChristNet guests are being locally "moteled" at night through grant funding provided under the auspices of Wayne County. Before enrolling, all prospective guests are being Covid-19 tested with alternative shelter provided for those registering virus-positive. In keeping with

past ChristNet practice, up to 28 guests will be emergency-housed with caseworker services offered to help secure more permanent and stable housing. Those in need can access emergency housing by calling 734-284-6999.

The ChristNet day center, which is currently located in rented space at the Church of the Nazarene in Taylor, will continue to provide other supportive services to the homeless, as well as safe opportunities for socialization. In lieu of hosting on a rotational basis at their own church buildings, congregations are asked to consider hosting a week of meals, particularly breakfast and lunch, for ChristNet guests. The meals will be made available to guests at the day center and motel. More information about meal hosting is available through Pastor Geoff Drutchas.

The transition to a 'moteling' model for this coming year was a major focus for Pastor Drutchas throughout the summer months as head of ChristNet's Strategic Initiatives Team. The homeless shelter was largely founded in the rooms of our church almost three decades ago. Our church's ongoing participation has been a vital part of our local mission outreach. In the midst of the Covid-19 pandemic day and night time shelter for the homeless has become more critical than ever due to closure of public-private spaces, including restaurants and commercial areas, where men and women could once escape from the cold.

ChristNet looks forward to opening its new, long-awaited daytime homeless services center, which will include showers, laundry facilities, and a commercial kitchen for food preparation, in early January 2021.
