PASTOR'S PEACE

The season of Lent is underway. At St. Paul Church our start-up observances were a mid-week onsite service with a distribution of ashes, followed by a Sunday morning service with the communion sacrament offered to all. Both services felt good to me. In the midst of everything so different, it's wonderful and important to enjoy the continuity which both worship services provided. Christians have been celebrating communion in much the same way for two thousand years. Our Lenten services contribute to that rich ongoing tradition.

Of course, the approach of Ash Wednesday this year brought some trepidation for me as pastor. For the night of the service, I had to figure out how to best distribute ashes in this keep-it-safe, hands-off time: no making crosses in ashes on the foreheads of worshipers coming forth to the chancel steps! Additionally, I had to check our ash supply since two years ago we hardly had any palms left over to burn for ashes and last year—because of the COVID-19 surge—there was no onsite worship for Palm Sunday and, consequently, no distribution of palms at all.

Fortunately, we did have some ashes left over from three years ago. Moreover, when I decided that we might best distribute them in baggies to individual worshippers as they arrived (rather than sprinkle them over the heads of worshippers as some Roman Catholic priests were determined to do), our Deacon Chris Schwab pointed me to the local Hobby Lobby where very small zip-lock jewelry bags can be bought. Thus, the night before Ash Wednesday found me "cutting" ashes and spooning them into the small zip-lock bags. In what I consider a new take on Jesus' "fish and loaves" miracle where he fed a multitude of five thousand with five loaves of bread and two fish (*Matthew 14:13-21*), I managed to prepare sixty bags out of what few ashes we had! The zip-lock tops really worked great: small chance of any ashes leaking out onto people's hands and clothes, which can make a real mess.

All looked well until the end of Ash Wednesday evening service when for the "Imposition of Ashes" I invited everyone to open their bag, dip their finger to properly blacken it with ash, and then make a sign of the cross on their own

foreheads. Everyone else got the hang of it just fine without, it seemed, any problems at all. But my own bag of ashes just wouldn't open, hard as I tried. Turns out my bag had a lot more lock in its zip than I ever expected. While some folks can't find their way out of a paper bag, I couldn't find my way into the smallest plastic bag. First, I resorted to trying to stretch it open; then I tried a chew-it-open technique. Neither worked. This was all happening in the pulpit with everyone watching. It was also captured on our live-streaming camera for the edification or entertainment of those following the night's service from home. However, our tech-team guy Michael Isaacs came to my rescue, providing me with his nicely-opened bag of ashes and our service, usually quite somber, finished with some laughter—me laughing as well.

Laying the spiritual groundwork for the entire Lenten season, the great theme of Ash Wednesday is humility. As ashes are distributed and "imposed" on foreheads, the words, "From ashes ye come; to ashes ye shall return," are invariably recited. As I struggled with that little baggie on Ash Wednesday night in the pulpit, I found myself already being humbled. Although laughter wasn't what I expected to generate, maybe that wasn't such a bad way to start the Lenten Season, reminded as I was of human folly and how the best-laid plans of men and women like ourselves can go astray. In the end, as in the beginning, we all need God to guide us, forgive, uplift us, and redeem us.

I hope this Lenten season can be a time of serious reflection for us all as we consider our need for God's loving help and the hope, courage, and love that can grow in our lives when we walk more closely and intimately with Jesus.

Twice-Weekly 'JERUSALEM WALK' Lenten Devotionals Coming Your Way

This Lent, COVID-19 has put a crimp in some of our usual Lenten activities, such as midweek services and Bible study. Thus, in lieu of what we usually do, church members and friends are receiving twice-weekly "Jerusalem Walk" devotionals. Each, arriving on Wednesdays and Fridays online, offers a moment in Jesus' ministry told by the Gospel of Matthew, followed by a prayer and some suggested Lenten-spirited activities. The devotionals continue all the way to Holy Week.

Providing opportunities for further engagement with the devotionals, weekly zoom sessions are being offered on Wednesdays, 7 p.m. Hosted by Parish Nurse Kathy Williams and past Council president Michele McNeeley with some technical assists from Eileen Vernor Drutchas, all zoom sessions focus on how we can relate the scripture, prayer, and suggested activities shared to our daily lives. Look for the zoom link on each emailed devotional.

As Christians we also know how our spiritual well-being is often connected to our emotional and physical health. To further help you stay active and positively focused in these months when we are more home-bound and home-centered than ever because of the COVID-19 pandemic, our St. Paul health ministry will also be sending information about how to creatively remain physically active. As encouragement and incentive, there will once again be an opportunity through our church website to confidentially post and track for your own benefit your progress in walking or pursuing other physical exercise.

In his own ministry Jesus walked at least 618 miles for us and sailed another eight miles or so. In the Lenten season ahead, we hope that you'll walk with him, taking those steps so important for your own spiritual, emotional, and physical growth and personal renewal.

Holy Week Celebrations Planned

Commemorating Jesus' final week in Jerusalem leading to Calvary's cross and the empty tomb, our St. Paul congregation will be celebrating Holy Week with three services. On March 28 we will inaugurate this fateful week in Jesus' life with a Palm Sunday Service at 10 a.m. In keeping with traditions, palms will be distributed to all worshippers. Also we will be confirming several young people in faith that morning, making our worship doubly meaningful.

Later in the same week, we will be observing Maundy Thursday with a 7 p.m. worship service on April 1, followed the next day by a Good Friday at 12 noon, April 2. Our Easter service will be held on Easter Sunday morning at 10 a.m. with a gathering outside the church afterwards to join in a hymn sing. All services will also be livestreamed for home viewing, then posted on our St. Paul Church website.

Throughout Holy Week the usual safety precautions will be maintained, including social distancing and masking. Please contact the church office (313-291-1221) if you have any questions about upcoming services.

Message from our Parish Nurse

Lent is a time for thoughtfulness, spiritual growth, and care for yourself individually and others, and sacrifice. This year we are hosting Zoom meetings on Wednesday evenings for six weeks at 7 p.m.that began on February 24. I hope that many of you will join us. The focus will be on the Jerusalem Walks distributed on Sunday and Wednesday during Lent. We will also discuss Faith and Fitness during the sessions. An email invitation will be sent to you each week to join the Zoom meeting including the click-on to join. You will be able to log in on our website also. Call Kathy if you have problems finding how to join the meeting.

We continue to need to social distance with masks/face shields until a time we no longer need to keep each other safe from Covi-19. I pray that you stay as healthy as you can. I look forward to a time in the future when we can go back to our normal everyday life. In the meantime, please reach out and call friends, relatives, and church family members. Call my cell phone if you wish to discuss health concerns.

Covid-19 Vaccination

Persons 65 years and older are now eligible for the vaccine. They are being administered by Beaumont or Henry Ford Health System in Wayne County and some other health systems that you use. One needs to have an on-line MyChart to be able to receive an appointment. Please inform others that do not have an MyChart that they should set one up with a trusted family member or friend that has an email address. Meijer stores are also providing the immunization on an on-line sign-up. Check with the pharmacy that you get your prescriptions with to see if and when they may be available. Wayne County Health Department is now giving appointments to seniors 65 and older. To get on the list contact your local Senior Center. WCHD will contact you via phone (cell phone with texting preferred) to set up an appointment. If you have no cell phone with text use a loved one's number. Let them know that they will be getting a text or phone call setting up your appointment. There are many seniors that still have not received their first dose. For those living in other county's, please check your county health department to see how they will be administered or go to Coronavirus - Vaccine Locations (michigan.gov) and choose the county in which you reside. This site will also give other Michigan Covid-19 updates as they are available.

Qualified Charitable Distribution – Did you know?

Although the Secure Act of 2019 changed the age for Minimum Required Distributions from 70 ½ to 72 years of age, it had no impact on Qualified Charitable Distributions. QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity, St. Paul does qualify. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your minimum required distributions (MRDs) for the year. Since it is already excluded from your taxable income, you can't take the itemized deduction (charitable donation) again. That would be double-dipping. While many IRAs are eligible for QCDs—there are requirements:

• You must be $70\frac{1}{2}$ or older to be eligible to make a QCD.

• The maximum annual amount that can qualify for a QCD is \$100,000. This applies to the sum of QCDs made to one or more charities in a calendar year.

• For a QCD to count towards your current year's MRD, the funds must come out of your IRA, generally by December 31.

Spring Rummage Sale is Cancelled

Despite hopes that the COVID-19 pandemic would diminish sufficiently to allow us to return to usual church activities in April and May, a decision was made by the St. Paul Church Cabinet of organizations to cancel any plans for the Spring Rummage Sale which is usually held at the end of April. The hazards posed for volunteers in both setting up the sale and opening the doors to the public remain too great, the cabinet decided. Much of the sale, which requires a week or more of set-up, is held indoors. Volunteers also spend long hours inside our first floor church rooms organizing, sorting, and setting up donated goods. None of the rooms have any air filtration system. Given the popularity of the sale and the large crowds drawn there is added exposure for volunteers working the sale.

Cabinet members, representing all of our church organizations, collectively expressed the hope that our church would be able to resume hosting rummage sales for the public this coming fall.

Christnet Continues Emergency Housing: Blue Jeans Needed

Working in tandem with the Wayne Metropolitan Community Action Agency with the assistance of federal funds under the CARES Act, ChristNet continues to welcome homeless men and women to its day center on Eureka Road and to accommodate guests at night in a local motel. Due to COVID-19 and the partial or total closure of so many churches, all of the rotational shelter programs across southeastern Michigan have, like ChristNet, shifted to "moteling" guests.

ChristNet continues to provide meals and clothing items to hosted guests. Breakfast and snack items are always needed. Local churches are also asked to consider hosting a week of meals for guests, individually packaged for distribution and microwave warm-up. Further helpful is the donation in all sizes of men's blue jeans—either new or seasoned but clean. Recently, ChristNet received a huge shoe donation which has been very much welcomed by the guests. Your Help is Needed for our Drive-Thru Lenten Fish Suppers

Our Lenten Drive-Thru fish suppers are launched. Upcoming suppers will be held on March 5, 12, 19, and 26; and April 2, 4-6 p.m. or until the fish runs out. Patrons will make use of the horseshoe drive to pick up their dinners from the "fish shack"—our conveniently positioned trailer at the west side of the church. The last of the suppers will fall on Good Friday, a day likely to make it popular with our customers. Cost of the fish suppers remains \$10—the same as last year, with a children's meal for kids ages 4-12 available at \$5. The dinner includes fish, french fries, cole slaw, pie dessert, and condiments. Macaroni-and-cheese has been dropped from this year's menu because of the difficulty of keeping it fresh and warm, while navigating through a kitchen with our volunteer safety protocols in place.

As with all church activities, masks, gloves, and social distancing will be maintained for all of the suppers. Volunteers are needed on the Friday of each supper, beginning early in the afternoon and continuing through the supper itself.
