PASTOR'S PEACE

Finally, we're outside for worship! Our first occasion was Pentecost Sunday. The morning temperature was pleasantly warm. There was some sunshine and a breeze. Some of our congregation chose to sit under the tent. Others sat outside it in family groupings. The sounds of our service carried. From what I was told, even by church members sitting in out-lying areas, everything could be heard. Especially relished was the opportunity to sing again as a congregation. Our hymn for the occasion? It was God of Grace, God of Glory, celebrating the outpouring of God's grace, love, and spirit upon his people. We sang with spirit too.

Weather permitting, we'll be continuing to hold services outdoors under the shady trees of our Church Green. On a few Sundays there will be exceptions. On Music Sunday, June 6, we'll be indoors so that we can take advantage of both our pipe organ and piano. That'll make it easier and more tuneful for our choir members, small ensembles, and soloists as they perform their special sacred music for us. But the rest of the time we'll be sitting on our folding chairs brought from home with the grass as our sanctuary carpet and local sights of God's creation as a meditation focus rather than our high-up window commemorating Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. Services will continue to be live-streamed via Facebook for those not able to come out or still hesitant about doing so.

Based on recent CDC guidelines we're still asking people to social distance with their chairs. Also, until further Council decision and notice to us, all masking continues to be the expectation when we're socially circulating, rather than sitting. While defending against the small percentage of possibility for contracting COVID in spite of one of the vaccines, continued masking is as must, if not more, for the protection of any unvaccinated in our midst. Technically, although not commonly, vaccinated men and women can briefly harbor COVID asymptomatically without ill-effect to themselves but still inadvertently spread it to others. As we've heard many times over in the last months masking inhibits both spread and receipt of COVID for the vaccinated and unvaccinated. However, at this point, the biggest beneficiaries of our continued masking are the unvaccinated.

I hope that those not yet vaccinated but eligible to do so will make the morally and socially responsible decision to get their necessary shot in the arm. Granted, there are some folks with an underlying medical condition that makes the vaccine sincerely inadvisable. Pregnant women, for instance, have to be especially careful. So do those with certain immune-system conditions. Kids younger than twelve do not yet qualify for the available vaccines. Yet, apart from kids, the population for whom the vaccine is not a good idea remains comparatively small.

Everyone who gets vaccinated helps get us back to normal and stay there, which is a good thing, given the many problems caused by our social isolation over the past year and more.

This past week I was heartened to learn at least one of the two-shot vaccines is proving effective against the COVID mutations showing up in India where an estimated three hundred million men and women have contracted the virus. This is important because a couple of those more highly contagious Indian COVID mutations have already found their way to Europe and the United States and in some states account for up to ten per cent of new pandemic cases.

What this means is that we really can put COVID in check in these summer months. But keeping the downward trend in infections is going to require ongoing vigilance and public cooperation with still more vaccinations. Even those of us who have received vaccinations may need to line up for a booster shot next year. Getting an annual COVID vaccine may be one more healthy habit we maintain. Rather than deny or fight against it, it is better to accept and adjust to that prospect now. It would be a real shame if all the sacrifices made in the past year were to be for naught—with us not learning anything from it all. It would also dishonor the lives of those who have already been casualties of COVID.

I am grateful for the leadership of our congregation that made sure that we did not have a COVID outbreak among our members through our own carelessness. Sad to say that was not true everywhere else among our Christian churches, who needed to set a good moral example for our nation at large. Surely God, who calls us to respect life, will judge this, as he judges all. I am glad that we as a people of God won't have to stand judged harshly on this count.

I look forward in faith to a positive, healthy summer and a vital, renewing fall as more and more of our usual church activities resume. Even the ordinary will be thrilling because we now know better than to take it for granted! God bless us all in summer and fall journeys ahead.

St. Paul Choir Hosts 'Seven Songs' Music Sunday Service

Under the baton of Music Director Tracy Hoffman, our St. Paul Choir will be hosting this year's "Seven Songs of Faith" Music Sunday Service on June 6, 10 a.m. To have the full advantage of piano and organ accompaniment, the "Seven Songs' service will be held indoors in the church sanctuary,

Tracy Hoffman will lead the choir in three different inspired anthems, including "One Song, celebrating that in Christ we are all God's children. Mark and Sandy Ennis will be performing a duet. Highlighting the capabilities of our 1948 Niemoller Pipe Organ, Sally Sigman will be sharing an organ solo for the occasion. Our service will conclude with the congregational singing of a rousing hymn.

Congregation Hosts ChristNet Week Meals

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic ChristNet guests have been moteled over the past year. But mid-June our congregation will join other churches in taking our own turn providing a week of meals for ChristNet guests. Our host week will extend from Sunday to Saturday, June 13-19. We will be preparing individually packaged suppers in our church kitchen and delivering them each night at 6 p.m. to the overnight housing site. ChristNet guests have access to microwaves for the quick warm-up food, which we will keep in mind as we prepare.

Teams of five are needed each day for food preparation. The teams, which set their own menu for the night, can designate their own times to meet for meal preparation. Meal packaging supplies will be provided. Also, assistance with actual delivery of the meals is available, depending upon team needs. Our St. Paul Youth Group is already committed to preparing ChristNet suppers for Sunday

and Monday, June 13 and 14. Team volunteers are needed for Tuesday through Saturday.

Although we will not be preparing breakfasts for ChristNet guests, donations of individually packaged breakfast items—juices, fruit cups, granola bars, cereal—are invited and appreciated.

In making use of the church kitchen for food preparation volunteers will be maintaining the same health precautions that were effective and helpful in hosting our recent Lenten fish suppers. CPR/First Aid Being Offered in June

Ideally, we would like two persons from each church group or committee to take a First Aid/CPR class. This will allow someone to be able to be a capable first responder to an injured person during church activities. Kathy Williams will lead an American Heart, CPR/First aid class which takes about 8 hours. There are restrictions in place due to Covid-19. No breathing into manikins, and gloves will be used etc. Classes will include two four-hour sessions. The class workbook will be available prior to the sessions. The workbook needs to be read prior to the class. We may be doing some classes on-line via Zoom or in session at church. The amount of actual on-line class time would be about 7 hours, broken into two sessions. An additional in person 1-on-1 skill testing will be arranged. Specific

GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

Highlights of the St. Paul COVID-19 Survey

A total of 90 people responded to our COVID-19 survey with regards to St. Paul. The Communication Ministry thought it would be appropriate to share some of the high-level results with you. The survey information has been used to plan for future activities and guidelines as we move forward. An example is that Sunday worship services outside no longer require wearing of a facemask and singing is now allowed, more changes will be coming over the next couple of months.

- \cdot 60% of the respondents felt that their family was doing very well handling the COVID-19 crisis.
- \cdot 63% of the respondents want to begin singing songs in our worship services again even if they had to wear a mask.
- \cdot 57% of the respondents felt it was still important to wear a facemask and maintain proper social distancing when inside the sanctuary during worship services.
- \cdot 66% of the respondents wanted to begin socializing with other members before and after our worship services.
- · 36% of the respondents wanted the church office to reopen.
- Respondents felt the church should take the following precautions for worship services and gatherings at the church: 85% wear a facemask, 76% social distancing, 57% avoid physical contact, 47% provide hand sanitizing stations, 57% discourage physical touching, 78% wanted the windows open during worship services, and 38% wanted one-way foot traffic in the sanctuary.
- · Respondents felt the church should take the following precautions for our children / youth activities: 64% reduce the number of people in each classroom, 82% wear a facemask, 61% prohibit snacks not individually wrapped, 56% no physical contact, 66% provide hand sanitizer, and 38% temperature checks.
- \cdot 67% of the respondents said they would attend an outside worship service.
- · 40% of the respondents said they would be willing to volunteer for church related activities (usher, greeter, rummage sale, etc.)
