PASTOR'S PEACE

This past month our St. Paul Confirmation class headed out on a day-long retreat to South Bass Island, better known as Put-in-Bay on Lake Erie. It's the site of the famous War of 1812 naval battle between Great Britain and the United States over the control of the Great Lakes, which the Americans won. We had a great time. The early September weather was wonderful—warm, sunny, and still summer-like. Adding to the pleasure of the day, we have a great incoming Confirmation class: new and returning Confirmands all got along really well. Finally, we had, joining me as pastor and guide, two parent-chaperones, Michael Isaacs and Sarah Medley Pettigrew, who were enthusiastic about spending the full day on our class outing.

For most of our confirmands it was a day of firsts—first time at Lake Erie, on a ferry, biking around an entire island, walking a meditation labyrinth, visiting a "Butterfly House," and enjoying the fruit of the vine at a winery (grape juice only). All of these points of interest and more were used as locations to read aloud from scripture and reflect together on the life of Jesus through very special moments in his ministry. For some, if not all of our confirmands, that was another first. They have never participated before in such a lively retelling of the gospel story.

At our ferry embarkation point, for instance, we read about Jesus calling his apostles from their fishing nets to become "fishers of men." Likewise, on the picnic table in the garden of the South Bass Island winery we shared the story of the wedding feast at Cana where at his mother's request Jesus performs his first miracle by turning water into wine. We finished the day and a dozen stops at limestone cliffs overlooking Lake Erie. There we read about Jesus exorcising a legion of demons from a man and casting them into a herd of pigs who then madly rushed over a cliff into the churning seas below where they drown. Needless to say, our own cliff-stop setting helped us visualize the Bible story all the more.

Unfortunately, the COVID pandemic curtailed some activities. The spectacular 352 foot-tall Perry Peace Memorial, a granite Doric column with a visitor viewer platform close to the top and reached by elevator, was closed. Meanwhile, as outing leader, I didn't think it was a good idea to venture into the confined breathing space of either of the island's two caves, despite the fact that there are one or two gospel stories, including Jesus' burial, that involve a cave. Yet we didn't dwell on what we couldn't do but, instead focused on all the good things which were possible. If they didn't know it already, our young people discovered that they could have a great, safe time together combining faith learning and recreation—and in the midst of a lingering pandemic. In its own way, that's a lesson for life and a reminder of how God is always seeking to bless us.

One of the bonuses of our day together was the higher velocity breeze, which kept us all cool pedaling our bikes along the several miles of the island's roads. But that wind also churned up the waves on Lake Erie, making them the biggest I have ever seen, comparable to those cresting on the Atlantic Ocean. Several of our confirmands seized the day and joined me for a swim along the island's rocky beach. It was a big thrill—except that we could have used a couple of surfboards. The rest of class differently enjoyed the Lake Erie waves on the ferry as we left the island behind to begin our two-hour drive home. They stood right at the ferry's bow and in a safe place enjoyed a repeated, thorough drenching as the pounding waves cast their heavy spray a hundred feet. Afterwards, I joked that while some of us took a bath in Lake Erie waters, the rest of us took a shower. It was all clean fun.

Our shared island adventure helped build fellowship and camaraderie among us. It's a day that I don't think any of our young people will forget. Perhaps one day, these same young people, grown, will be encouraging their own kids to take the leap of faith with confirmation and try out the wonderful adventures that church life in Christ can provide. All the church school retreats I experienced had a big spiritual impact on me. I'm so grateful that through its ongoing Christian education ministry our congregation can provide similar, positive experiences for our youth, who are the future of Christ's church. Please continue to keep our youth and our youth leadership (especially Pastor Cheryl Schalm and our Sunday School teachers) in your prayers.

'Four Points Service' -World-Wide Communion Sunday Celebrated

The four points of the compass in Christ will be celebrated at World-Wide Communion Sunday, October 3, 10 a.m. Four different breads will adorn the altar that morning. Pastor Geoff Drutchas' morning message will focus on Jesus' "great commission" to share the gospel across the globe. In keeping with our COVID year practice, communion "kits" with sealed wafer and juice will be provided by the elders to worshipers when they arrive. Those following the worship service live streamed on Facebook are encouraged to use bread and juice from their home kitchens which will be consecrated with prayer during the communion service.

Our St. Paul congregation observes an open communion for all baptized adult or confirmed Christians regardless of particular church membership. Non-members are invited to fully share in the communion meal, renewing their own commitment to walk more closely with Jesus Christ.

Rummage Sale Begins – First in a Year and a Half

There's no shortage of inventory at this Fall Rummage Sale, slated to begin Thursday, October 7 and continue through Saturday mid-morning, October 9. All that's needed now are some dedicated volunteers and a little sunshine to ensure a great sale.

This is the first rummage sale in more than a year due to cancellations resulting from the COVID pandemic. Tables for the display of items were set up in Fellowship Hall on September 11 and the West Room, beginning September 27. Our Men's Fellowship also set up its outside tent to receive larger household items, including furniture.

Since mid-September, a handful of volunteers, coordinated by St. Paul Trustee and Women's Fellowship President Toni Hill, have been unpacking and distributing rummage donations to the appropriate tables. Donations can be dropped off at the church during office hours, 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. through Monday, October 4. Drop-offs at other times can be arranged by appointment with the church office (313-291-1221). All donated items need to be clean and in a good state of repair for resale.

A lot more help will be needed for final set-up days, sale days, and the Saturday wrap-up when unsold items need to be boxed for removal. As a precaution against COVID the more confined space of the parlor is not expected to be used this rummage sale. Also, shoppers at the rummage sale will be asked to mask. Those arriving without a mask will be provided one at the door using supplies made available without cost to our church by the Detroit Metro Association for the United Church of Christ.

All proceeds from the Fall Rummage Sale support the mission and ministry outreach of our church.

ChristNet and Wayne Metro Community Agency Partnership Provide Homeless Housing

The ChristNet Shelter and the Wayne Metro Community Action Agency will continue to partner this fall to provide emergency housing for the homeless. All guests are being locally hoteled due to the difficulty of hosting the homeless in church facilities in the face of ongoing COVID risk. ChristNet, however, maintains its Eureka Road daytime center providing breakfast foods and a full lunch on site.
