PASTOR'S PEACE

Deep in the past when I was a kid, probably still waiting for my own second set of teeth to come in, there was a screechy popular song that got replayed again and again. The words remembered: "All I want for Christmas are my two front teeth..." Now when I've reached that point in life when I am trying to keep all of that second set intact with the help of my dentist, that old tune comes to mind anew. But, this Christmas, I'm concerned about a lot more than my front teeth or any teeth at all. More than ever, I'm concerned about the state and fate of our world.

Last week, after a long hiatus because of the pandemic and related suspension of gatherings, I was invited once more to offer a prayer and invocation for the Economic Club of Detroit as it welcomed to its podium the CEO for DTE Energy. I kept my prayer short as always requested, but it expressed my own concerns to God—concerns that linger:

O gracious God, at a time when our nation is beset by challenges from all sides...from pandemic, from climate volatility, from domestic strife...give us the cool heads we need in our present crunch. Help us to value reason over suspicion, emotion, and opportunistic ambition. Restore to us a sense of civic virtue upon which any healthy republic depends. Above all, renew in each of us a commitment to the common good with a special concern always for the well-being of the least in our midst and for those younger and future generations who will inhabit the world along with any and all unresolved troubles we leave behind. Amen.

If I didn't have faith and confidence in the God whom Jesus revealed to us through his ministry, I might be among those right now despairing about our future. Yet, as the Apostle Paul declares, "God works for good in all things with those who love him." (Romans 8:28) Indeed, I believe God is always working

redemptively for the benefit of the faithful and this world he created even when we can't see anything happening. I am happy that we have both the Advent and Christmas seasons ahead to help us recharge and renew our faith in God's redemptive, healing love, frustrating what is truly evil and turning what is merely bad to the good.

Of course, on top of any other troubles that might come our way, the last year and a half of the pandemic have been a terrible strain for all of us. We particularly see the impact in the short fuses of many and the discouragement and lack of motivation in others of all ages. I simply hope that we--and folks like us-- can open our hearts and minds to the encouraging message of hope that God delivers every time we celebrate Christmas. We all need to remember how a baby born at Bethlehem became a turning point for our world and how he can continue to transform our lives today if we put our trust in him. May we have the wisdom to put Christ at the center of our lives, especially in these weeks of Advent and Christmas ahead, so that we might be strengthened in the power of hope and know the peace, love, and joy that God always wants for us.

'Candlemas Service' Signals Advent's Start

The Advent season, marking a new Christian year and preparing Christians for the Christmas celebration ahead, will be launched with a special Candlemas Service on the Sunday after Thanksgiving, November 28. Candlemas, combining the words "candle" and "mas," as in mass or service, is an ancient tradition of the Christian church, set aside as a time to dedicate all the candles to be used in the life of the church throughout the year. We revive the tradition this year with a particular purpose--to dedicate new blue Advent candles that we will be lighting week-by-week, observing the great themes of this pre-Christmas season.

For Candlemas Sunday only one Advent candle will be lit, symbolizing Hope. However, there will be plenty of cause to ooh and ahh as our sanctuary's Christmas trees, flanking the altar, are lit for the first time as our service concludes. Come join for a service intended to help light up our lives in these weeks leading to Christmas.

'Hanging of the Greens' and Communion Welcome Advent Season

With paired Angel Trees, a nativity scene, a shining star, and a Wise Man banner all in place within the St. Paul sanctuary, a "Hanging of the Greens" Service with pew communion will be celebrated on the second Sunday of the Advent Season, December 5. For his sermon on "Our Christmas Trimmings," Pastor Geoff Drutchas will highlight the faith significance of those images and ornaments which are perennially at the heart of our Christmas celebration. The morning liturgy will include prayers of consecration for all the decorations which prepare our homes for a sacred Christmas.

Worshipers arriving that morning in the church narthex will be receiving communion kits from the elders. Those worshiping at home and following the service live streamed and invited to make use of bread and juice from their own kitchens. All elements will be blessed and consecrated by prayer as our communion meal begins. Our congregation observes an "open communion." Church membership is not required to share in this Christian sacrament.

'Advent of the Unexpected' Lessons & Carols Festival Upcoming

St. Paul Church members and friends are invited to join in the great carols of the season as our congregation gathers for the third Sunday of Advent, December 12, 10 a.m. Retold will be the stories of those events leading up to the births of both John the Baptist and Jesus, revealing God's new plan for humankind. Plan on lots of joyous singing as we listen to the word of the gospel according to both Matthew and Luke which share the most details about the pre-nativity of John and Jesus.

'Emmanuel Service' Celebrates 'God with Us'

On the fourth Sunday of Advent, St. Paul Church members will gather for an "Emmanuel Service" in which we relight the first three Advent candles and ignite the fourth, celebrating the arrival of the one who, in keeping with Old Testament prophecy, is "God with us." The carols, readings, and message on Sunday, December 19, will highlight the "Emmanuel" theme—a term reserved by ancient Israel for the savior and messiah who was to come. During the service, representatives of different church fellowships will be invited to come forward to light the four Advent candles.

'One Night in Bethlehem' Christmas Eve Services Celebrated

St. Paul Church members and friends are invited to a joyous "One Night in Bethlehem" Christmas celebration as we gather together to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ with double services on Christmas Eve. A candlelight service will be held at 4 p.m. in our historic and beautifully decorated sanctuary. Winter weather permitting, we will gather outdoors in front of our steepled church at 7 p.m. for a "living nativity" pageant

Christian Education will be holding their second annual live nativity Christmas pageant on December 24th on the front lawn of the church.
