Of course, one of the robed shepherds, Anthony Staten, did have a challenge keeping his sheep on track with his lead rope. For a few moments, it looked like there was going to be a wrestling match. But Anthony, firmly but gently, prevailed and the pageant went on. The rest of our pageant participants marched up with the animals and delivered their candles to the Christmas wreath on the table at the top of the steps at the front door of our church. It was a memorable night with a memorable message about God's love for us in Jesus Christ. Those who missed out might want to take a look at the service on our church's website. Also posted online is the four o'clock service which, along with no shortage of carols and special music, was a little more traditional with a message about an incarnational, incandescent faith in which we embody the love and righteousness of Jesus Christ and seek to take his light into the world. As pastor, I just want to thank everyone who helped make both Christmas Eve services, indoors and outdoors, possible. Our thank you list includes Pastor Schalm, Music Director Trace Hoffman, our chancel choir, our dedicated tech team, our deacons and ushers, our poinsettia decoration team, our office staff, our digital sign coordinator Charlie Barnard, and last, but hardly least, our children who during our second service helped the Bethlehem story vividly come alive once more. God bless all of you for making Christmas Eve all the more sacred and holy for us all.

Sanctuary Masking Resumes Due to Covid Surge

Due to the COVID surge that is swamping local hospitals, our congregation will be joining other churches asking members to mask during sanctuary worship services where social distancing is more difficult to maintain. The masking request will continue through February 6 with a monthly review by the St. Paul Safety and Security team and Church Council. The goal is to keep everyone safe and well during the remaining days of Christmas and the Epiphany season ahead. At present, no masking is necessary for church activities where children are *not* present and social distancing is possible. However, church members should also feel free to mask up for any church activity or program. Your support and cooperation with masking are appreciated. Disposable masks are available from the deacons if you do not remember to bring one.

Sanctuary services Continue to be Facebook 'Live Streamed'

Sunday morning services in our sanctuary continue to be Facebook 'Live Streamed' at 10 a.m. each week. They can be viewed on Facebook at other times as well. In addition, a video recording of the service is posted on our St. Paul church website by early Sunday afternoon at <u>www.stpaulucctaylor.org</u>. Both the order of service, *Morning Tide* announcements, and the pastor's message for each Sunday can also be downloaded from the web site, beginning Saturday, prior to the service. As needed, the *Morning Tide* announcements with the 'Fellowship of Concern' prayer list are updated through Sunday morning as additional prayer requests are received.

Those watching the live streamed service may share comments and requests. However, it is not possible to respond to any posted requests until after the worship service concludes. Prayer requests can also be made by contacting the church office (313-291-1221) during the week and speaking directly with Pastor Geoff Drutchas or Administrative Assistant Cindy Romas, as well as by leaving a voicemail message.

Elders Lead First New Year's Service

St. Paul Elders Barbara Schultz and Mark Ennis led the Sunday morning service on January 2, along with Music Director Tracy Hoffman in the absence of Pastor Geoff Drutchas who had an inadvertent COVID exposure while visiting with his 91 year-old father-in-law in Washington, D.C. on Christmas Day. Barb Schultz delivered the sermon prepared by Pastor Drutchas on the Twelve Days of Christmas, inspired by the popular carol of the same name. Mark Ennis shared opening and morning prayers, as well as the announcements for the day.

Double-vaxxed and "boosted," Pastor was doing fine without any symptoms. All COVID tests were also negative. But following church safety protocols and CDC guidelines, he will continue to quarantine and perform multiple tests before resuming on site church activities. He remains available in ministry by phone (313-319-1759). Pastor Drutchas was grateful that Barbara Schultz, Mark Ennis, and Tracy Hoffman, along with organist Sally Sigman, were able to ensure that no beat was missed in Sunday morning worship.

Epiphany Season Start Celebrated with Communion Sacrament

The new season of Epiphany will be celebrated with the communion sacrament on Sunday, January 9. Officially beginning with Three Kings' Day, January 6, Epiphany extends for six weeks following the Twelve Days of Christmas. It is symbolized by the Bethlehem star which the Wise Men-Kings followed to reach Jesus' manger side.

Those arriving for sanctuary worship on the first Sunday of Epiphany morning will receive individualized, sealed communion wafers and juice cup from the elders and ushers greeting them in the narthex. These communion "kits" can be opened at the time of the sacrament. However, you may want to partly peel back the seals in advance readiness.

Those joining worship at home via Facebook live streaming are encouraged to make use of bread or cracker with grape juice from their own kitchen supplies. All communion elements, whether in church or home, will be consecrated by Pastors Geoff Drutchas and Schalm as part of communion prayers.

At St. Paul Church we observe an open communion which means that participants do not need to be formal members of the congregation to share in the sacred meal. Instead, what is simply asked is that we be baptized Christians of adult age who seek to walk more closely with Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. All participants, whether at home or church, are called to share in this time with a spirit of profound reverence.

St. Paul Church Choir Visits Sister Oxford Church in show of Support

In a show of support for a sister congregation touched by the recent violence in Oxford, Michigan, our St. Paul Chancel Choir will be traveling to Immanuel Congregational United Church of Christ of Oxford to perform for their Sunday Service on January 9. Four youths were killed and seven more wounded, including a teacher, in the shooting at the local high school on November 30 by a fellow student. Two shooting victims, including art student Madisyn Baldwin who lost her life, were part of the Immanuel Church family.

The St. Paul Choir visit has been arranged and coordinated by our Music Director Tracy Hoffman. Immanuel's pastor, the Reverend Liz Wilson, a former high school teacher turned pastor, welcomed the prospect of our choir's visit as a morale booster for the congregation. A free will "love offering," which was received from members of our church throughout the month of December, will be presented by Tracy Hoffman and the choir to the Immanuel Church family at the time of their scheduled Sunday morning visit.

Annual Congregational Meeting Set For Third January Sunday

The annual meeting of the congregation will be held on Sunday, January 16, immediately following the 10 a.m. service. End-of-year reports from Church Council members (elders, deacons, and trustees) and various committees and organizations of our congregation will be shared. A presentation of the financial report for 2021 will be followed by a proposal for a 2022 unified budget. Also, a slate of candidates for the Church Council will be presented by the trustees for a vote of the congregation to fulfill positions of elder, deacon, and first and second vice president. A bylaw revision will also be presented to the congregation for consideration with final approval scheduled at the semi-annual meeting in July 2022.

Outgoing President Timothy Ruffner and President-elect David Lange will preside at the annual meeting with presentations by Treasurer Dan Case and reports by Pastor Geoff Drutchas. Following election by the congregation at large during the annual meeting, new council members will be installed at the Sunday morning service on January 19.

Upon arriving on Sunday morning on January 16 for both the worship and meeting, St. Paul members are asked to sign in at the narthex table to help establish a quorum. Everyone's participation counts. A printed copy of our church's annual report, which will be referenced throughout the meeting will also be available for pick-up. A deacon will be on hand to answer any questions you may have about sign-in, morning worship, or the meeting.

St. Paul Church Members Carry On ChristNet Week Tradition

The COVID pandemic may have suspended rotational ChristNet host weeks for churches like our own which previously saw us sheltering up to thirty homeless guests for seven days and nights in our own Fellowship Hall. But our mission and outreach to the homeless was not entirely stymied. During the last several days of November and the first week of December, St. Paul teams prepared and delivered 135 dinners to homeless individuals and families being locally hoteled. The meals were prepared each late afternoon in the church kitchen by a different team of four to five volunteers and then delivered by Pastor Geoff to the housing location. The menu night-to-night was widely varied and all the more appreciated by homeless guests who enjoyed ample portions.

Our St. Paul congregation was instrumental in the launching of the ChristNet rotational shelter three decades ago. In light of the enthusiasm of our volunteers, our congregation will probably host another week of meals in the months ahead.
