PASTOR'S PEACE

Some months ago, when I was looking up a funeral home death notice for a high school friend who had passed away prior to a fiftieth reunion gathering I expected to attend, I inadvertently came across an obituary for someone else altogether—and from two years earlier. Ostensibly, it was a standard newspaper obituary, the kind that families often purchase to let others know that a loved one has died and to alert everyone as to funeral arrangements. This obit was printed with a photo of the deceased—an eighty-four-year-old Minnesota woman. But the six sentence content of the obit was unlike anything I have ever seen or might ever want to see again for someone else.

The obit started out completely factual, noting the late woman's birthdate and the name of her parents. Thereafter, it cited a marriage and the birth of two children. But then in terse words the obit reported an affair with her brother-in-law just five years into her marriage, resulting in yet another child and the abandonment of her first two children by a sudden move to California. The older children were then reared by the runaway mother's parents. The final two sentences of the obit were real scorchers, indicating the date and place of passing, but adding that she "will now face judgment" and "she will not be missed" by her two older children who "understand this world is a better place without her."

Apparently, the death notice created quite a stir after the newspaper publication. There was so much controversy that the newspaper yanked it from publication within a day. However, it quickly went viral, picked up widely online and on Facebook where it survives to this day. Both the original obit and its online version drew public comments by some who had known the deceased and others who had not. A couple of folks who had actually known her described a "wonderful person" and insisted that "there is a lot of stuff missing from the obituary." At the same time there was an acknowledgment that the children who had purchased the obit were angry and hurting. Meanwhile, perhaps not surprisingly, those who neither knew the deceased woman nor her children were simply disposed to debate the

appropriateness of airing dirty family laundry in this way, particularly given the old shibboleth that we should not speak ill of the dead.

As I read the obit, I was struck, as so many were, by its harshness. Whatever happened to Christian forgiveness? I was reminded in the moment of the words of Shakespeare who in one of his great plays, Julius Caesar, writes "The evil that men do live after them; the good is oft-interred with their bones." On the other hand, I too understand the pain of this woman's children, who obviously believe (as I do) that there should be accountability in life and death for our actions. Sin and trespass should never be treated lightly, given the havoc they cause for human life. Underscoring this, doesn't scripture warn us that the sins of parents shall be visited upon their children to the third and fourth generations? (Deuteronomy 5:9; Numbers 14:18) This is not to say that God punishes children for their parents' mistakes but rather that the damage done by the sins of one generation has a way of spilling over into successive generations. Indeed, bad habits witnessed and thereby taught by example can be hard for children to shake as they grow into adulthood and independence, however much they try. Family cultures where infidelity, mean language, physical violence, and drug or alcohol abuse persists have a way of replicating themselves from one generation to the next. It often requires a huge and sometimes painful effort on the part of any children to change the course of behavior, so that what they experienced and grew up with is not repeated for their own children.

I agree with the great Protestant reformer Martin Luther that there is no special spiritual realm between heaven and hell called Purgatory as the Roman Catholic Church long taught. But in light of the frailty of human nature and our penchant for sin, I have often wished there was such a place where folks who have led semi-dastardly lives or worse could chill out for a time and spiritually purge their sinful ways, cleaning up their act before anticipating any welcome into God's full presence. Barring the existence of Purgatory, we have to leave everything to the judgment of an all-seeing, all-knowing God, measuring our deeds and misdeeds. Significantly, the same passages which note that sins of parents are visited upon their offspring, generation to generation, also emphasize God's loving, forgiving nature. They are joined by many other scriptural passages affirming that God is generous and gracious as well as just with all sinners, never condemning men and women quickly or needlessly. (Exodus 43:7; Nehemiah 9:17: Psalms 65:3)

In my own life I prefer to reserve any "Big J' or ultimate judgments to God, making only tentative, "Little J" judgements about people and situations for myself. I am certainly not all-seeing or all-knowing like God. And inspired by Jesus on Calvary's cross who said, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do," I try to keep in mind that much sin arises from sheer ignorance alone, rather than any deeper evil. (Luke 23:34) Rather than striking out on our own and striking out at others, it's better on our part to leave sinners to God providing they are not presently threatening us with murder and mayhem which needs to be promptly halted and capped for the protection of ourselves and others.

I don't doubt that the children who published the obit on their wayward mother felt a flush of pleasure in their deed. They seized the opportunity for a moment of vengeance and comeuppance. Yet their mother's wrong did not make their own mean-spiritedness in broadcasting it right. Silence on their part would have been better without burying or hiding in more intimate settings of meaningful and healing conversation the hurt their mother caused by her infidelity and betrayal of them as a parent who should have stuck around—at least for them.

February is the month when Valentine's Day is celebrated and red hearts seem to festoon everything. Amid any gushing sentiment, how important to keep in mind that the love which Christ proclaimed and encouraged us to embrace is bigger than romance and profounder too. As Jesus's disciples, we are called to love even the unlovable, struggle though it may be. To this end, may we each do our best to be as forgiving and gracious to others as God is to us.

Congregational Meeting Approves Unified Budget and elects New Council Members

Our St. Paul congregation held its annual meeting immediately following the Sunday morning service on January 16. Reports from last year were presented either orally or in written form from our pastors, parish nurse, elders, deacons, and trustees. Also included in the meeting booklet available for pick-up in the narthex was a printed 2021 financial report, showing a surplus, plus the proposed unified budget for 2022. Both the 2021 financial report and the unified budget proposal for 2022 were accepted through motion and a vote of the congregation's quorum. Salary increases for staff were included in the approved 2022 budget.

As further points of business for the meeting, a proposed bylaw revision clarifying a section on terms of office for Council members and eligibility for reflection was officially submitted for review. The bylaw revision will be voted on at the regularly scheduled semi-annual meeting in July 2022.

Another important part of the congregational meeting was the election of new Council members with a full slate officially presented by the Trustees to the congregation. Approved for three year terms were Toni Hill (trustee); Pat Staffeld (elder), Conrad Heidt (deacon), and Sue Mrowka (second vice president). Aaron Johnson was elected to a two year term to serve as first vice president and president, filling a vacancy created by the resignation of Jim Poet last fall. Along with Dave Lange, who is moving from his role as first vice president to president, all the new Council members were formally installed during the Sunday morning worship on January 30.

At the close of the meeting with outgoing president Tim Ruffner and incoming president Dave Lange presiding, outgoing Council officers were thanked for the leadership they provided during their respective terms of office. Outgoing Council members are Deacon Jim Nault, Elder Chris Schwab, and President Tim Ruffner.

Qualified Charitable Distribution - Did you know?

Although the Secure Act of 2019 changed the age for Minimum Required Distributions from 70½ to 72 years of age, it had no impact on Qualified Charitable Distributions. QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian, payable to a qualified charity, St. Paul does qualify. QCDs can be counted toward satisfying your minimum required distributions (MRDs) for the year. Since it is already excluded from your taxable income, you can't take the itemized deduction (charitable donation) again. That would be double-dipping. While many IRAs are eligible for QCDs—there are requirements:

- You must be 70½ or older to be eligible to make a QCD.
- The maximum annual amount that can qualify for a QCD is \$100,000. This applies to the sum of QCDs made to one or more charities in a calendar year.
- For a QCD to count towards your current year's MRD, the funds must come out of your IRA, generally by December 31.

The next opportunity to give the gift of life by donating blood is coming on February 18th from 12 p.m. to 6 p.m. It is important that you sign up ahead of time, but remember there needs to be at least 59 days between donations. You can make appointments for/at your own convenience through the Internet by www.redcrossblood.org. In the upper right-hand corner under 'Find a blood drive', you will type in 48180 (the Zip code for Taylor) and click on the blue arrow. On the left side of the next page dates for the Taylor area will show. Choose and select 'Choose my Date' and type in February 18th, then 'Refine Search' click on the red 'refine results'. You will then be directed to the next page listing our blood drive. Click on 'set times' for St Paul UCC to sign up. You will need to register & obtain a password. IDs & passwords are case sensitive. Once there, register for a time available. On the day of the drive, be sure to download to your phone or print out a Rapid Pass prior to coming. Also to save time at your appointed time read the educational materials & complete the health history online.
