PASTOR'S PEACE

It's hard for me to believe but the weeks of Lent are almost done. Holy Week looms nigh, beginning with Palm Sunday and culminating in our Easter morning celebration. On Sundays to come we'll soon be singing some of Christendom's greatest hymns —our own version of "Oldies but Goodies," like *Crown Him with Many Crowns*, *The Old Rugged Cross*, *Christ Arose*, and *In the Garden*.

I love these wonderful oldies. How could anyone not? And I relish the thought of all their strains resounding across our sanctuary as we join in their words and melodies. Yet there is another hymn, much newer and no less faithful and wise, that I think needs to be part of our Holy Week and Easter repertoire too. It's a hymn entitled *This is a Day of New Beginnings*.

Unlike other dear and favorite hymns of our church life which may date back as much as a century and more, *Day of New Beginnings* was written as recently as the early 1980s. The composer, Carlton Young, is a Methodist minister from Hamilton, Ohio, near Cincinnati and only 250 miles from Detroit. Meanwhile, the hymn's words were penned by Brian Wren, an English Congregational pastor. He hails from Britain's United Reformed Church, theologically very much aligned with our own United Church of Christ. Their combined effort has created a very poignant, moving hymn.

All in all, I would describe Carlton Young's hymn tune as mellow and even a little meandering, albeit in a very melodic way. However, Brian Wren's choice of words is pithy, direct, and to the point. Consider these verses:

This is a day of new beginnings; time to remember and move on; Time to believe what love is bringing, laying to rest the pain that's gone.

For by the life and death of Jesus, God's mighty Spirit, now as then, Can make for us a world of difference, as faith and hope are born again. Then let us with the Spirit's daring, step from the past and leave behind Our disappointment, guilt, and grieving, seeking new paths and sure to find.

In faith we gather round the table, to taste and share what love can do. This is the day of new beginnings; our God is making all things new.

For me, this is a memorable hymn, full of heart and faithful truth. Although not included in the Easter section of our church's *Chalice Hymnal*, I think it makes a perfect Easter hymn.

While the first verse implicitly equates God with love, the second verse not only alludes to Christ's crucifixion, but also his resurrection which we experience in a faith and hope "born again" thanks to "God's mighty spirit." And this in spite of any "disappointment, guilt, and grieving" on our part. The final verse anticipates our gathering around the communion table, just as we do on Easter morning, tasting and sharing "what love can do," suggesting forgiveness and reconciliation where conflict and acrimony once prevailed. Thereafter, the hymn's final line underscores its overall resurrection theme, boldly declaring that "This is the day of new beginnings, our God is making all things new."

Despite all that's wrong in the world and whatever may be amiss in our own lives, we do have a God committed to our redemption, healing, and renewal. Moreover, God has shown this to us both through Calvary's cross and Jesus' empty tomb. Young and Wren speak to my soul and faith with their beautifully crafted hymn about all of this.

I know that each of us have our favorite Lenten and Easter hymns. But I hope that you can appreciate why I find *This is a Day of New Beginnings* so meaningful and well suited for the Easter to come. May you too be stirred, uplifted, and reassured in your own Christian faith by the hopefulness of this hymn's message as you next hear it with ears and heart, along with all the other great hymns of the season. God bless us all as together celebrate the "new beginnings" that a loving God makes possible and reveals to us anew this Easter.

Your Help is Needed for our April Drive-Thru Lenten Fish Dinners

Three more drive-thru fish dinners will be held during the month of April. April 1, 8 and 15, 4-6 p.m. or until the fish runs out. The April 15th Good Friday drive-thru is an added bonus this year. Those arriving for dinner, often double or triple-parked on the east side of the church, are given a number for their dash: traffic merges in numerical order keeping everybody happy as they proceed through the horseshoe drive to pick up their dinners from the "fish shack"—our conveniently positioned trailer at the west side of the church.

Cost of the fish suppers are \$12, with a children's meal for kids ages 4-12 available at \$4. The dinner includes fish, french fries, cole slaw, dessert, and condiments.

As with all church activities, appropriate safety and good housekeeping will be maintained for all of the suppers. Volunteers are needed these last three dinners on Friday beginning early in the afternoon and continuing through the dinner itself. Confirmands to Recite Apostles' Creed and Share Testimonials

Second year confirmands will be participating in Sunday morning worship services during the last days of Lent. First and second year confirmands will be reciting the Apostles Creed in unison before the congregation during the, April 3, 10 a.m. service. Both that day and on Palm Sunday three confirmands will be sharing personal testimonies about their faith journey and reading a psalm selected for them. Actual confirmation follows on Palm Sunday, April 10.

Congregation Invited for Breakfast Honoring Confirmands

It's called a "Continental Breakfast." But a wide array of cereals, bagels, donuts, muffins and freshly-cut fruits await our congregation following worship on Sunday, April 3. The breakfast honors our confirmands who will be "examined" in faith earlier that morning during the service. Complementing buffet offerings, a variety of coffees and teas, plus milk and juices will also be available at a beverage bar.

The Continental Breakfast Buffet is hosted by our church's Christian Education ministry. Join fellow congregants that morning in honoring our young people who are being welcomed into adult membership of our church.

Three Young People to Be Confirmed in Christian Faith

Three ninth graders will be confirmed in Christian faith at the Palm Sunday Service on April 10, 10 a.m. Kaitlyn Isaacs, Angel Staten, and Dylan Stull are finishing two years of study with Pastor Drutchas and Sunday School Teacher Doreen Thompson. They will be invited to be baptized (if not already) and affirm their Christian baptism and discipleship in a special ceremony that will welcome them into adult membership within our church. Each will kneel for consecration and then, rising, receive from the hands of their parents a personalized stole decorated with symbols of their individual life journey so far. Later that week, on Maundy Thursday, they will be receiving their first communion.

Palm Sunday Service Starts Holy Week

Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem at the start of a week culminating in his arrest, crucifixion, and resurrection will be commemorated during Palm Sunday services on April 10. In keeping with tradition, palms will be distributed to all parishioners at the close of 10 a.m. worship. Church members will be invited to come forth to the chancel steps to receive the palms, along with a personal blessing from Pastor Geoff Drutchas and a presiding elder. During the morning service, three young disciples will be confirmed in their faith.

The palms are often kept by church members at home and returned to church the following year for use in preparing the ashes that are distributed on Ash Wednesday.

Maundy Thursday 'First Hill' Service with Bread and Cup Communion Held

A "First Hill" Service will be held on Maundy Thursday this year, April 14, 7:30 p.m. remembering Jesus' final night with his apostles in the Garden of Gethsemane on Jerusalem's Mount of Olives before facing crucifixion on Mount Calvary the next day. As part of the Maundy Thursday service, worshippers will be invited to come forward to receive a communion of cut bread and poured cup just below the chancel steps. Three newly-confirmed young people of our congregation will partake of their first communion that evening.

The "maundy" in Maundy Thursday Service is an Old English variation on the more familiar words "mandate" and "commandment"—a reference to Jesus' command to love God and love one another.

Lectors Needed for Good Friday 'Seven Last Words' Service

Lectors or readers are needed to assist with our Good Friday service, which will be respectively held on April 15, 12 noon. Good Friday lectors will participate in a liturgy based on Jesus' seven last "words" or declarations as found in the four gospels of the New Testament. Copies of the liturgy will be available at least one week prior to the services for all lectors.

Those interested in volunteering as lectors are asked to notify the church office and Pastor Geoffrey Drutchas. No previous lecturing experience is necessary.

Good Friday 'Seven Last Words' Service Recalls Jesus' Passion

Church members and friends are invited to attend a noontime Good Friday Service in the sanctuary of St. Paul United Church of Christ on Friday, April 15. Originally known as "God's Friday," Good Friday commemorates Jesus' sacrifice on the cross. Our Good Friday liturgy or order of service will be based on Jesus' compelling final words to his disciples and followers both before and from the Cross. Worshipers are asked to depart in complete silence.

Special Baptismal Service Offered During Easter Vigil

Those who have not been baptized into the Christian faith but wish to be welcomed through the sacrament of baptism are invited to a special Easter Vigil Baptism Service on Saturday, April 16, at 6:30 p.m. Pastor Geoffrey Drutchas will offer the baptismal sacrament in the chancel of our sanctuary. Families and friends of those coming for baptism on the eve of Easter are also invited to attend. Candidates for baptism are asked to contact the church office in advance to let Pastor Drutchas know of their desire to be baptized. Baptismal certificates will be prepared for presentation that night.

Baptismal services on Easter Eve are part of the church's most ancient traditions. At St. Paul all baptisms are performed through an anointment of baptismal waters, rather than a full-body immersion as practiced in some other Christian churches. In keeping with the ecumenically-minded practice of the United Church of Christ, our congregation does not rebaptize those who have already received the sacrament elsewhere. However, where a baptism is in doubt, our pastors can administer the sacrament with special prayers to God, who knows, as we may not, our spiritual standing.

St. Paul Congregation Celebrates Easter Resurrection with Open Communion

Our St. Paul congregation will be celebrating Christ's resurrection with a morning service on April 17 at 10 a.m. Our Chancel Choir under the leadership of Music Director Tracy Hoffman will offer an Easter anthem for Christianity's most important holy day. Pastor Geoffrey Drutchas will be preaching that morning, assisted by Pastor Schalm and members of the church.

An Easter pew communion will be served with worshippers invited to come forward to the chancel steps to receive both the wafer and poured cup from the pastor and presiding elders. Alternatively, the usual communion "kits" are available for pick-up on arrival for those who prefer to receive communion in their pew, rather than at the front of the sanctuary. Our congregation observes an open communion which means that all adult, baptized Christians are invited to share in the communion meal even if they are not church members. St. Paul members are encouraged to invite friends and family members to share in our joyous Easter morning services.
