PASTOR'S PEACE

It's hard to believe but summer has almost arrived. The church lawns look especially green and lush because of all the spring rains. Every so often in the early morning hours you can see deer and fox traverse them, following in their own way the Sexton-Kilfoil tributary of the Ecorse River that runs along the back of our church acreage. What a peaceful, calming scene. In places like England or even our eastern seaboard states like Maryland and Virginia, this kind of beautiful stretch of church land is often poetically called the "glebe." On many mornings, if it's not raining, I like to simply walk the horseshoe drive that half-encircles our church, taking in the sight of our church grounds, praying as well as contemplating.

The battle for Ukraine continues with a brutal loss of life every day. A distant North Korea fires a fresh ballistic missile, meant to intimidate. Meanwhile, more homeward there are tragedies too—a devastating tornado in Gaylord, Michigan and a series of horrific mass shootings across the nation, bringing abiding grief and anguish to families like our own.

Amid our fears, tears and consternation in the face of so much that stresses us and is unjust and wrong, how important it is for us to not let what is negative and hurtful edge out or obscure the fact that we live in a world which God is still striving to redeem. Moreover, even amid all of this life's tragedies and horrors, there remains much beauty to behold, a token of a still greater beauty and joy that God, who sacrificed his own son for our salvation, wants us to know and enjoy.

In the days and weeks of late spring and summer ahead, I hope that each of you will seek out your own chosen place of calm and beauty where you can contemplate, meditate, and pray with God. Wherever we pause in repose (remember that our beautiful church grounds are open and available to you too), may we each be renewed in confidence that God's grace continues to abide. In all that might seem damaged and broken God is working redemptively to bring healing and restore wholeness to our lives and world.

A TIDING MOMENT OF SHARING: OUR SEARCH TIMELINE

In the last Council communication with the congregation since the retirement announcement of Rev. Dr. Geoffrey Drutchas, we began a timeline of transition toward our future

On March 14th, we announced Geoff's retirement effective the end of 2022.

March 15th thru May 4 the council developed the church profile consuming over 300 hours of combined development time. The church profile is needed to begin the search process for a new pastor with the United Church of Christ. The profile details our buildings, campus, mission, history and a host of other information related to the St. Paul congregation, its demographic make-up and financial status. The Church Profile is essentially our Help Wanted Ad.

May 5 the draft of the Church Profile was completed.

May 7 the council reviewed the draft of the profile and made changes at the Council Retreat and compiled candidates for the Search & Call Committee.

May 10 the council approved the Church Profile for publication to the UCC to Rev Phil Hart

On May 10, the council reviewed candidates for the Search and Call committee led by Senior Elder Mark Ennis and approved by acclamation the slate of candidates who accepted nomination.

On May 11, the Church Profile was submitted to the UCC for signoff. Rev Phil Hart transferred our Church Profile to Cheryl Burke who will be assisting the Search & Call Committee from this point forward. The work of the Search & Call Committee mandates total confidentiality in order to protect applicants during the search process.

May 24th Council and the Search/Call Committee met with Rev. Cheryl Burke from the Michigan Conference to officially begin the Search for our new Pastor. We are not looking to replace Rev. Geoff. He cannot be replaced. We are looking for a new Pastor as we look toward our future.

On June 4th, 1st Vice-President Aaron Johnson and Rev. Dr. Geoffrey Drutchas will attend the Michigan Conference meeting representing our congregation.

On June 12th, we will introduce and install the finalized and settled, appointed members of the Search & Call Committee in our worship service

When we initially announced the retirement of Rev. Dr. Geoffrey Drutchas we stated that the congregation would be invited to a self-study and community learning process. This process will be carried out in the form of focus groups.

The focus groups will inform the Search & Call Committee of the identity of our church's imagination for the future and corresponding pastoral needs so they can effectively discern, as led by the Holy Spirit, to select a pastoral candidate for the congregation to call. We will be seeking everyone in the congregation who is willing to participate in the focus groups.

After the Focus Groups are conducted our search committee will read ministerial profiles, screen candidates, conduct interviews, check references, and eventually select a candidate who will be recommended to the entire congregation for call.

It is our goal through the focus groups that everyone in the congregation has a say and participates in the process for the congregation to elect, in a unified way, a new pastor whose gifts God can use with us and among us for the sake of the Gospel.

We will prayerfully seek a pastor with particular gifts and skills while recognizing that candidates are also engaged in a Spirit- led discernment process. We will keep you informed on a regular basis as we move toward God's future as a congregation.

Biographies of the Search & Call Committee

Mark Ennis, Chair

Mark Ennis attended Grace Reformed Church for the first 45 years of his life, where he served as the Choir Director for 27 years. He also served as a Deacon and was on the Search Committee when a new pastor was selected there. began attending St Paul UCC Church with his wife and two daughters in 2000. (His wife, Sandy, had attended St Paul until her marriage to Mark in 1979.) Shortly after he started, the choir director resigned, and Mark was selected as the Music Director for the church, and served in this role until his retirement in 2017. is also serving as an Elder at the church, and has been actively involved in many of the activities at the church, such as serving on the Church Council and the Worship Planning Committee, serving (and singing!) at the church dinners, and singing in the choir after he retired as Music Director. As head Elder, Mark was asked to lead the Search Committee, and quickly accepted because he believes the pastor plays a fundamental role in shaping the life of the church. He wants to see our church continue to grow and serve the community, carrying on its rich heritage of sharing God's word and doing God's work. His favorite hymn is "The Old Rugged" Cross. Mark cherishes the opportunity to work with the team and the congregation to select a pastor worthy of following in Pastor Geoff's footsteps.

Aaron Johnson (APPOINTED CO-CHAIR BY MARK ENNIS)

Aaron Johnson has been a member of St. Paul United Church of Christ for over three decades and was baptized by Rev. Dr. Geoffrey Drutchas. Aaron has served as Deacon, 1st Vice President and next year will serve as President. Aaron also serves on the Financial Advisory Ministry for the church's endowment. Aaron is currently enrolled as a seminarian student with Moody Theological Seminary pursuing a Masters in Divinity. One of Aaron's favorite hymns is Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing. The hymn carries powerful lyrics:

- "Tune my heart to sing thy grace, streams of mercy, never ceasing to call for songs of loudest praise."
- "He (Jesus), to rescue me from danger, bought me with his precious blood."
- "Here's my heart, O take and seal it; Seal it for thy courts above."

A Bible passage that speaks to Aaron is Romans 5:2 that came to him in a dream where he was instructed to tell others to rejoice in the hope of sharing the Glory of God: Through Jesus the Christ we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in the hope sharing the Glory of God.

Aaron affirmed the call to serve on the Search & Call Committee because he believes affirming the call was the instruction and calling by the Holy Spirit.

Marjie Barnard

I'm Marjorie (Marjie) Barnard and have been a member of St. Paul United Church of Christ since 2001. Shortly after becoming a member I was hired as the bookkeeper and held that position until retirement in 2017. I have been a member and an officer of the St. Paul Dorcas Society for nearly 20 years. I have been a member of the St. Paul Choir since 2018. In 2008 when the Fish and Loaves Community Food Pantry began operation, I became a volunteer in the client registration office and subsequently became the bookkeeper because of my experience at St. Paul. The Bible passage that speaks to me is Matthew 7:12, So in everything, do unto others what you would have them do to you.
