Totenfest Service Remembers Family Members and Friends

Church members who have passed away over the last twelve months are being remembered at the Totenfest Service on Sunday, November 6. As their names are read aloud near the end of the service, our historic 1911 church bell will be rung in honor of each deceased member. In keeping with custom, a special liturgy based upon the words of the Apostle Paul will also be offered as a part of the 10 a.m. service. Prior to the start of worship, altar candles will be lit for each church member and friend being memorialized Totenfest morning. Also, a large separate candle will be lit remembering all who have lost their lives due to the coronavirus.

Memorial Sunday always immediately follows All Hallows' Eve (Halloween), All Hallows' or All Saints Day, and All Souls' Day—three back-to-back observances in the traditional calendar of the Christian churches in which those who have died are remembered and celebrated.

Communion Sacrament Offered During Memorial Sunday Service

The communion sacrament will be offered during Totenfest, our Memorial Sunday Service, November 6. Our pastors and elders will be serving communion at the chancel steps but providing communion 'kits' to those who, arriving at church, prefer to partake of communion in their pew. The individually wrapped and sealed wafer-and-cup communion 'kits' will be consecrated along with those elements shared through communion trays at the front of the church, as well as bread and juice from home kitchens utilized by those following the Facebook live streamed service. Those receiving communion at the chancel steps will be invited by the deacons to step forward up the center aisle, returning to their pews via side aisles afterwards.

At St. Paul United Church of Christ, we observe an "open communion" which means that formal membership in our church is not required to share in the sacrament. We welcome all confirmed in faith or of adult age to the sacred meal that Jesus began in an upper Jerusalem room with his apostles before facing Calvary's cross.

'Bread and Cup to Faith and Giving' Stewardship Appeal Made

Our St. Paul congregation will be living the theme of this year's annual stewardship appeal as we move from celebrating the communion sacrament on the first Sunday of November to a celebration of faithful Christian stewardship the very next Sunday, November 13. The importance of our gifts of time, talents, and treasure to our shared ministry will all be emphasized on Stewardship Sunday with Pastor Drutchas preaching on the subject. Faith commitment cards will be received and consecrated with special prayer and blessing at the end of the service.

Stewardship appeal letters were sent to all church members and active friends in mid-October with a faith commitment card and sealable envelope enclosed. Your enveloped cards can be deposited in the tithe box at the entrance to the sanctuary on Stewardship Sunday or returned to the church office any time. As indicated by your mailed letter, any faith commitment made can be revised according to any changing circumstances in your own household.

Also, the Christmas trees flanking the altar and the traditional star above the pulpit will be lit for the first time. St. Paul Hosts ChristNet Meals

In lieu of housing homeless guests overnight for a week as in past, pre-Covid years, our St. Paul congregation will be hosting a week of suppers for ChristNet guests who are being locally moteled, beginning Sunday, November 27 and continuing through Saturday, December 3. Volunteers are needed to help prepare the daily suppers for approximately 25 homeless guests. The catered meals will be delivered to their motel accommodations where they will be distributed. Approximately, 4-5 volunteers are required each night for meal preparation in our church kitchen.

Our ChristNet week continues the traditional support which our congregation has extended to the homeless shelter program which our own members were so instrumental in launching almost three decades ago. This past September ChristNet opened its spacious and attractive daytime center which, besides providing a refuge from the streets, offers laundry and showering facilities, plus classroom space for learning and training programs intended to help homeless quests gain housing security.

Building Maintenance and Improvements Continue

Taking advantage of the warm Indian Summer weather, St. Paul trustees arranged for the necessary repair and partial resurfacing of our large parking lot. Cracks were filled and stressed areas freshly top-coated to extend the life of the asphalt in the face of the coming winter freeze. The improvement is visible. Also, Trustee Michael Isaacs with a personally recruited team installed on our church's behalf a set of four ceiling spotlights to improve sanctuary lighting for Sunday morning Facebook broadcasts. At the same time, to minimize sunlight glare, the stained glass window closest to the pulpit was tinted. Although the tinting is barely noticeable indoors and outdoors, it too improves our church's broadcast quality. Please extend your thanks to the trustees for their good work.

Fall Rummage Sale Proceeds Reported

The St. Paul Fall Rummage Sale during the first full week of October proved to be a success with no shortage of wares to sell. The array of clothing and household goods displayed in Fellowship Hall and West Room was particularly impressive. However, the garage and tent had a smattering of furniture and equipment that attracted enthusiastic buyers. At the end of the sale, total reported proceeds indoors were \$5700 and outdoors (garage and tent) were \$2381. When combined, sale proceeds reached \$8,081, equaling, if not topping, pre-Covid rummage sale profits.

Besides being a solid fundraiser for the church, the sale is a major recycling event that also provides opportunities for low-cost shopping for area families and individuals. Once again, rummage sale volunteers heard from customers that the St. Paul rummage sales are the best to be had in Taylor and the surrounding communities. Thanks is due to the Women's and Men's Fellowships and many volunteers who step forward every spring and fall to make these sales possible.
