PASTOR'S PEACE

The first Sunday of Advent, a New Year for us as Christians, began pretty dramatically and memorably. I fainted in the pulpit, not long after the service started. This has happened before for me--more than a decade ago on Christmas Eve. Fortunately, this time, not unlike last, I had a soft landing in more ways than one. While briefly flat on the ground as if I was taking a short nap in the chancel, I was able to get up without difficulty—albeit surrounded by those eager to help, including our resident sound tech and skilled EMS worker Eric Poet and our emergency response team. I had my first ride ever in an ambulance, ending up at Beaumont Hospital-Taylor, where I have visited so many church members over the years. However, in this case I was the emergency room patient.

As it turned out, everything checked out fine as I underwent a battery of tests from chest X-Ray, a lung CAT scan, and a MRI brain scan. There were multiple blood tests too over the next dozen hours before my discharge close to midnight. As I previously informed the congregation by email, there was no evidence of any heart or brain problems, nor infection. The consulting doctor advised me that in one third of instances where folks faint, there is no discernible cause. Obviously, if it happens again, I will have to probe further as to any lingering cause. Meanwhile, I'm doing the best I can to simply pace myself for these weeks ahead—important weeks as we celebrate anew the birth of Jesus Christ.

In the Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany seasons we often speak about the "gifts of the season," remembering the Wise Men who arrived at Jesus' crib with treasures. I treasure the gifts that I see right in our congregation--our gifted Pastor Cheryl Schalm who stepped right up to the pulpit on the first Advent Sunday and carried with the service as EMS took me away; our lay leaders who quickly rallied to help me and then support Pastor Schalm in her worship leadership; and our congregation who raised me up in prayers and showed their caring heart, so typical of who we are as God's people gathered at St. Paul United Church of Christ. It was equally reflected in the full house of worshippers just the week before as members and friends came together to acknowledge and celebrate all that we have shared over more than three decades of "Ministry Together." I deeply appreciate the love and concern in Christ so apparent in these two very different Sundays.

All this concern, affection, and goodwill, I will deeply miss as I retire from my pastoral leadership of our church. This makes the Advent season all the more poignant for me. But as we proceed with our Advent observances and prepare for Christmas to come every day is more precious for the fact. I am looking forward to this full Advent and Christmas season shared as our church life recovers from the past two years when, due to community health concerns, it was so much more challenging to be together. May God bless us all with good health, good cheer, and an ever-deepening faith in these seasons of the Christ Child.

Second Advent Sunday Observed with Communion and Confirmation

As our congregation gathers for the Second Advent Sunday December 4th, lighting the second candle of the season symbolizing the peace which Jesus brings to our lives, our St. Paul worship hour will be doubly special. Besides sharing in the sacrament of communion, our attending members and friends will confirm in faith three young people who have been enrolled in confirmation class throughout this past year and this fall. Evelyn Hard, Adia Pettigrew, and Tovah Pettigrew will all come forward to confirm their baptism and be welcomed into the adult life of faith.

By tradition, the confirmation ceremony has always coincided at St. Paul Church on Palm Sunday. However, with Pastor Drutchas' impending departure and an accelerated fall schedule and catechismal program, each is ready for confirmation.

Since communion will be shared at the end of the service, it will be an occasion of first communion for the confirmands as well.

This Second Advent communion will again make use of communion kits distributed to arriving worshipers by the elders. At St. Paul Church we observe an open communion, inviting all men and women of adult, confirmed faith to share in both bread and cup. Church membership is not required. However, all are asked to make a renewed commitment through this sacred meal to walk more closely with Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.

'St. Paul Day' Dawns Soon at Santa's Magic Forest

Santa's Magic Forest, the Downriver's "finest holiday display," has opened its doors at the Activity Building in Taylor's Heritage Park for the four weekends of the Advent season. Organized entirely by community volunteers, the Magic Forest features nearly two dozen heart-warming North Pole and Christmas scenes populated by animatronic figures. A number of the scenes were first installed at the Hudson's Department Stores. There is an opportunity for children to have their pictures taken with Santa and Mrs. Claus, as well as the Grinch.

St. Paul Church members are invited to help welcome visitors to Santa's Magic Forest on Saturday, December 10, 12 noon to 8 p.m. Volunteers are being scheduled for two hour slots, serving as guides and docents, or handling vestibule admissions.

All proceeds from modestly-priced tickets (\$3 each) sold at the door on weekends supports Michigan's largest client choice food pantry, located on Northline Road, just a mile from our church. It is a major pantry fundraiser, purchasing more than a month of food to stock the pantry shelves. Through its store-like setting, the pantry provides groceries at no cost to families in needs across seven Downriver communities.

After St. Paul Day, Santa's Magic Forest will continue through Sunday, December 18, open on Friday evenings, 5-8 p.m., Saturdays, 1-8 p.m., and Sundays, 1-7 p.m. To volunteer for St. Paul Day or for more information, speak with Pastor Geoff Drutchas or call the church office.

'Share the Light' Festival of Lessons & Carols Upcoming

Making Room For the Christ Child and a Home for the Savior

The Sunday School Christmas Pageant, *Making Room for the Christ Child* and a Home for the Savior, will be held on Sunday, December 18th. This year's pageant will be intergenerational, incorporating the voices of choir members and older youth. The pageant will be part of the morning's worship service being held in the sanctuary. The youth sponsored cookie walk will be held and a light

Christmas luncheon will be served following the service. A special visit from Ole' St. Nick is also expected.

Christmas Eve Services Return to Traditional Schedule

In a beautifully decorated sanctuary that especially shines at night, Christmas Eve services at St. Paul United Church of Christ will be offered at their traditional times again—both 7 and 11 p.m. In keeping with our Christmas Eve worship custom, partially disrupted for two years because of Covid concerns, the night will include joyous carols, a children's story time (7 p.m.), a retelling of the Christ's birth, a chancel step communion for those who prefer it, as well as the final singing of 'Silent Night' and the Lord's Prayer in candlelight.

White candles will be offered to worshipers as they arrive for each service that night. Also, those who prefer to use communion 'kits' for the sacrament in their own pew instead of stepping to the chancel steps to receive bread and cup will be greeted by elders who can provide them. Christmas Eve worshippers following the Facebook live-streamed service may, alternatively, use elements from their home kitchen which will be consecrated with prayer along with all other elements shared that holy night.

Church members are encouraged to invite their families and friends to join with us with our sacred observance of Christ's birth and the start of the twelve-day Christmas season.

'Shepherd's Morn' Christmas Morning Service Set

It happens only every seven years. But this is the year when Christmas Day arrives on Sunday. Our congregation will be gathering at its usual 10 a.m. hour for worship, continuing our celebration of Christ's birth. In his last sermon before departing from St. Paul United Church of Christ, Pastor Geoff Drutchas will preach on the message which the shepherds brought to Mary and Joseph at Bethlehem's manger side where the infant Jesus lay. Communion will be offered, which may be especially important for those not able to attend the previous Christmas Eve services in the dark.

Following the service, there will be refreshments in Fellowship Hall. Church members and friends are invited to bring Christmas cookies to share. The cookies should be dropped off in the church kitchen prior to the service so that they can be readied for the Fellowship Hour in advance.

Annual Congregational Meeting Scheduled

The annual meeting of the St. Paul congregation will be held on Sunday, January 15, 2023. In addition to reviewing reports on our ministry and programs over the past year, the congregation will be voting on a new budget and a slate of nominees for Council leadership. The annual meeting will follow our 10 a.m. worship service that morning. Church members should sign in at the narthex and pick up a copy of their annual report.

St. Paul Church Hosts ChristNet Suppers

St. Paul United Church of Christ is hosting a week of suppers for ChristNet Homeless Shelter guests, November 27 through December 3. Among St. Paul groups hosting the nightly suppers for 25 shelter guests are the Girl Scouts, the Women's Fellowship, and the Youth Fellowship. Small groups of individual volunteers are hosting the other nights.

The mostly hot meals are being delivered to a local spot where homeless guests are being hoteled until a permanent shelter opens in March 2023. Other Downriver churches have also scheduled host weeks for December, January, and February.

St. Paul United Church of Christ was instrumental in founding the ChristNet shelter more than three decades ago. Partnered with the Wayne Metro Community Action Agency which has funded the hoteling of guests since the start of the Covid pandemic, ChristNet has a new day-time home on Eureka Road in Taylor where it is able to provide a refuge from the streets, as well as case-working assistance as homeless men and women seek to recover lost identifications and secure the necessary services and training to restabilize their lives.
