COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: The Ultimate Gift

I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, it is he that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing. – John 15:5

"The Ultimate Gift" is a novel by Jim Stovall that was made into three films which tells a story about a highly privileged, spoiled young man by the name of Jason Stevens who some may argue benefited from a trust fund or as others saw it was nearly ruined by the trust fund. The Ultimate Gift became three films: The Ultimate Gift, The Ultimate Life and The Ultimate Legacy. Jason fell in love with all the gifts life had to offer as long as he could take it to the bank. When Jason's oil tycoon billionaire Grandfather Red passes away, Jason inherits 12 gifts to challenge him to become a better man. The sequel to the film The Ultimate Life may be considered a prequel in a way as we learn where the idea of the 12 gifts came from and how Red became a billionaire. The third film, The Ultimate Legacy focuses on the life of Joey Anderson who is guided by Jason Stevens who in turn teaches the lessons he learned from Grandfather Red to transform a troubled Joey. Jason reflected the attributes of Jesus into the life of Joey and transformed him through their relationship.

The lesson in the films is Life is how you live it, not how you spend it. And the way to live life is suggested by the Twelve gifts and Jesus lived his life demonstrating each of these 12 gifts:

- The Gift of Work: Jesus did His Father's work (John 5:17)
- The Gift of Money: Jesus taught giving to the poor (Matt 19:21)
- The Gift of Friends: Jesus laid down his life for friends (John 15:12-14)
- The Gift of Learning: Jesus learned everything from the Father (John 7:16)
- The Gift of Problems: Jesus teaches us not to be anxious (Matthew 6:25-34)
- The Gift of Family: In Jesus we are God's children (1 John 3:1)
- The Gift of Laughter: Laughter shall overcome weeping (Luke 6:21)
- The Gift of Dreams: God declares we shall dream dreams (Acts 2:17)
- The Gift of Giving: Giving testimony of the Risen Christ (Acts 4:33)
- The Gift of Gratitude: Be grateful for receiving God's Kingdom (Heb 12:28)
- The Gift of a Day: Sealed for the day of Redemption (Ephesians 4:30)
- The Gift of Love: The greatest of these is love (1 Cor 13:13)

The root of each of these gifts can be found in our passage from John 15:5. The best way to receive these gifts is to cling to Jesus the Christ. A branch that is separated from the vine as Jason was in his encapsulated, trust fund financed life, Jason found himself cut off from the nutrients and true living waters found in Christ alone that bring forth the fruit of the Spirit. Jason neglected his time with Jesus in prayer, scripture reading, worship with a community of faith whenever possible, and in so doing, Jason's capacity to serve the Christ, to reflect Christ in the lives of others suffering was muted. It was only when

Jason learned these 12 gifts that he was able to teach others and reflect the work of Christ in each of those attributes. When we remain in Christ, Jesus not only sustains us, but works through us to do great things for the Glory of God and in the lives of others.

Jesus prayed often to His Father. In John 17, Jesus prayed for His disciples and He prayed for all believers to come. Jesus prayed for you as recorded in verse 20 in the Garden of Gethsemane, "I do not ask for these only, but also for those who will believe in me through their word,..." before his betrayal and arrest. Jesus believes in the power of prayer and devoted himself to prayer and ministry to God's Word as our example. Pray for those serving on Council, for those serving on the Pastoral Search Committee, for our Interim Senior Pastor Rev Reed, for Christian Education, and for our congregation to come in-person as each are able to join in the presence of Christ on the Holy ground of our sanctuary for worship together, for singing together, enjoying the music ministry together and taking communion together.

How can we connect in Christ Monday through Saturday? A daily study of God's Word keeps us connected in Christ.

So, Jesus said to the Jews who had believed him, "If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." - John 8:31-32

Being in the Word daily can change lives as Jason found in the Ultimate Gift series and as Jesus did who picked twelve unknowns nobody would have chosen to transform the world. Being in the Word transforms our future ministries in Christ and in so doing brings joy to lives around us.

Ruth Bell Graham, wife of evangelist Billy Graham, once told a humorous story about their daughters, Anne and Bunny. When Ruth ran to the kitchen to investigate some loud cries, she found three year-old Bunny holding her hand to her cheek, looking disapprovingly at her sister. "Mommy," explained five-year-old Anne, "I'm teaching Bunny the Bible. I'm slapping her on one cheek and teaching her to turn the other one so I can slap it too."

When we are wronged or offended, our first response is more likely to fight back than to turn the other cheek. But many have found that fighting back can be counterproductive.

Missionary E. Stanley Jones was being publicly slandered by someone he had once helped. Jones' first response was to write his accuser a letter he relates was "the kind of reply you are proud of the first five minutes, the second five minutes you're not so certain, and the third five minutes you know you're wrong.

Jones knew his comments would win the argument, but lose the person. "The Christian," he said, "Is not in the business of winning arguments, but of winning people," and he tore up the letter. A few weeks later - without having said a word, Jones received a letter of apology from the one who had turned on him.

While the Christian way is not always the easiest way, it eventually proves to be the right way! May God grant us the patience, courage and strength to take it.
