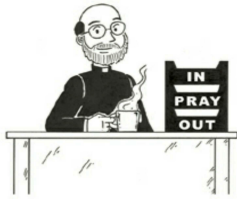

A WORD FROM THE PASTOR



On a recent Sunday we heard Jesus ask the disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" and then, "Who do you say that I am?" It was important for Jesus to get a read on what the public reaction to him was but it was even more important for the disciples to come to a decision about their assessment of Jesus. What does he mean to them? What is their relationship? How do they relate to this person? What does he mean to them?

It was important for the disciples to come to terms with these questions and they are important for us to address, as well. How do we think about Jesus and what does he mean to us? Is he some distant historical figure? Is he one who resides far removed from us in Heaven? Do we have a real relationship with him? If so, what kind of relationship is it? Here are some common titles given to Jesus. This is not an exhaustive list but is fairly representative. Take some time to reflect on these and how you see Jesus. I also encourage you to find someone to talk with and share what you have discovered. I would also be interested in hearing from you.

Savior, Redeemer, Bread of Life, Lord, Creator, Son of the Living God, Only Begotten Son, Beloved Son, Alpha and Omega, Master, King of the Jews, High Priest, Prophet, Teacher, Emmanuel, Advocate, Mediator, Judge, Chief Cornerstone, Author and Finisher of Our Faith, Master, Lamb of God, Good Shepherd, The Word, Fountain of Living Waters, Rock, Messiah, Elder Brother, Lord, True Vine, Bridegroom, Dayspring, The Lion of the Tribe of Judah, The Bright and Morning Star, The Image of the Invisible God, I Am, Son of Man, The Way, the Truth and the Life, King of Israel, Christ, Sacrifice, Holy One of Israel, Wonderful, Counselor, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace, King of Kings.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: Nicodemus By Night

Now there was a man of the Pharisees named Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews. This man came to Jesus at night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher who comes from God, for no one can do these signs that you do unless God is with him." Jesus answered him, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless one is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." -John 3:1-3

Nicodemus was an esteemed rabbi who had a favorable view of Jesus, but who kept his admiration of Jesus a secret. Nicodemus, who is not mentioned in the Synoptic Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, was also a member of the Sanhedrin (John 3:1). In the writings of Josephus and the Gospels the Sanhedrin is presented as a political and judicial council headed by the high priest. The Talmud also describes the Sanhedrin as primarily a religious legislative body headed by elders, though with certain political and judicial functions. The Talmud, meaning 'teaching' is an ancient text containing Jewish sayings, ideas and stories. It includes the Mishnah (oral law) and the Gemara ('Completion'). The Mishnah is a large collection of sayings, arguments and counter-arguments that touch on virtually all areas of life. John's writings introduce us to Nicodemus. We meet Nicodemus three times in John, most prominently in dialogue with Jesus which provides the context for arguably the most well-known verse in the Gospel known as John 3:16 often revealed at football games during a field goal attempt.

Why did Nicodemus visit Jesus at night? Nicodemus, perhaps, feared losing his status as an esteemed religious leader, his reputation, his ability to provide for his family, and what appears to be his wealth given the 75 pounds of myrrh and aloes he provided for Jesus' burial (John 19:39). In John 3, we notice Nicodemus, humbly addressing Jesus as Rabbi. As they talk, Nicodemus admits he believes Jesus is the redeemer foretold in prophecy. Christ responded by telling him, "Verily, verily, I say unto thee, except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." Nicodemus replied, "How can a man be born when he is old? Can he enter the second time into his mother's womb and be reborn?" Jesus explained that a person who wants to follow God must be born twice: once in the natural and once in the spiritual. Nicodemus was truly in awe with Jesus' words. Jesus reminded Nicodemus that Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness (Numbers 21:3-7) and the Son of man will be lifted up on the cross taking away the sin of the world. Jesus taught that no matter people's knowledge or their works everyone needs to be transformed. Transformation only happens when the Holy Spirit convicts us of wrongdoing and transforms us into a new creation. Being informed by the Gospel is only the beginning of our renewal, being transformed by the Gospel is a new life in Christ. In football's favorite Bible verse of John 3:16, Jesus tells Nicodemus: For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believes in him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

Nicodemus, a Pharisee, was held in high regard among the Jewish leaders and served on the Sanhedrin along with Joseph of Arimathea (Luke 23:50-51). Joseph would eventually purchase the burial plot for Jesus. Joseph had not

consented to the Sanhedrin's guilty verdict of Jesus (Matt 27:57; Mark 15:43; Luke 23:50-51). Nicodemus carried out his official capacity as a member of the Sanhedrin as the members contemplated Jesus. John 7:32-47 shows us that Pharisees and priests sent temple guards to arrest Jesus, but they return, unable to arrest Jesus. The guards are rebuked by the Pharisees. Nicodemus advises Jesus should not be dismissed nor condemned until they have heard from Him personally: "Does our law judge a man without first giving him a hearing and learning what he does?" (John 7:51). The rest of the Sanhedrin abruptly dismiss the counsel of Nicodemus given they appear to have already decided to put an end to the threat of their power they see in Jesus.

Although Joseph, and presumably Nicodemus, had dissented from the Sanhedrin guilty verdict upon the Messiah, their dissension played a role in God's plan of salvation. The Talmud rules that a unanimous guilty verdict by the Sanhedrin must be thrown out and the defendant must be exonerated allowing the guilty defendant to walk free! Accounts of Jesus crucifixion on Calvary's Cross clearly indicate Jesus did not walk free. Today the path Jesus walked with His cross is represented by the Via Dolorosa commonly known as the Sorrowful Way or the Way of Suffering or the Way of Sorrows.

Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus publicly and clearly associate themselves with Jesus after his death on the cross. Perhaps they thought his ministry had come to an end and no longer had nothing to gain or lose. Joseph and Nicodemus teach us a lesson in that we should not wait until it's too late to follow Jesus publicly and be born again both as individuals and as a congregation. Ezekiel 36:26 teaches, "I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit within you." Being born again applies to our congregation in this time of transition as Rev Reed helps us to determine who we are and where we want to go. What will St. Paul's next mission be in reaching out to the local community? Being born again as a congregation means that we have a new identity, purpose, and ministry for our congregation as we determine where we want to go as our Search Team seeks a settled Senior Pastor. Let's not wait for things to be just right as Joseph and Nicodemus did in their relationship and identity with Jesus, but engage now in creating the future identity, purpose, and ministry in Jesus' name for St. Paul UCC Taylor.
