COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE: Parable of the Vineyard Laborers

What is a parable? From C. H. Dodd: (The Parables of the Kingdom, New York: Charles Scribner's Sons, 1961, p. 5) "At its simplest a parable is a metaphor or simile (story) drawn from nature or common life, arresting the hearer by its vividness or strangeness, and leaving the mind in sufficient doubt about its precise application to tease it into active thought." The meaning of most parables is not so obvious, or at least it shouldn't be. If we assume we know what Jesus is talking about, we are probably missing the main point; if we are too familiar with the story, we may not glean its deeper truth.

We might think that Jesus spoke in parables to make it *easier* for people to understand the Christ message. Jesus explains clearly, he does NOT expect everyone to understand. Jesus expresses in Matthew 13:10-13: Then the disciples came and asked him, "Why do you speak to them [the crowds] in parables?" He answered, "To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of heaven, but to them it has not been given. For those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. The reason I speak to them in parables is that 'seeing they do not perceive, and hearing they do not listen, nor do they understand.'

Consider the Parable of the Vineyard Laborers located in **Matthew 20:1-15**. Most people attempt to make this a parable about economics. Biblically, it is a lesson in the abundance of God's Grace which has no scarcity. The farmer has to get much done in due time. Overwhelmed by lack of progress he decides he needs to hire more laborers. In verse 7 a question is raised: 'Why have you been standing here all day long doing nothing?' <u>"'Because no one has hired us,</u>" they answered.

What is the solution to feeling unwanted or without a purpose in life? The ultimate solution is for us to come to know God's Grace and show others God's Grace. Salvation is for all eternity. Salvation brings the quality of eternity into our daily lives today. By coming into the graceful salvation of Christ the Lord, we come to know our worth. The price of all of us becomes priceless when Jesus the Christ comes into life. A case for those not hired is an illustration of God's Grace for all people. No matter when in life we discover Salvation in Christ, the gift for us is just as it was for the penitent thief on the cross. The final hour added meaning to both the penitent thief on the cross and that of the laborer's life. In the business world we may typically find a pattern where the last hired is the first fired. In God's Unending Grace: Last hired is the first paid. This lesson can be applied to many stories throughout the Bible. Again, the penitent thief on the cross who asked Jesus to remember him (Luke 23:33–43), Jesus answered him, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise." The thief may have lost out on

the companionship that the disciple that Jesus loved (John) enjoyed, but he was in store for an eternal companionship ahead of him without having to do all the work John would do in later life. Why didn't Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus go along with the Sanhedrin such that Jesus would be let off according to Jewish law under a unanimous decision? Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea cast their minority vote on behalf of Jesus, which was recorded by God to their glory throughout eternity. Joseph of Arimathea can be considered the laborer who showed up during the day, he was not a disciple but a follower. Nicodemus within the final burial hours of Jesus, shows up publicly for work and perhaps comes to finally understand what Jesus meant by being born again. We should come away with four gifts:

- 1. Generous unending Grace of God found in the Salvation of Jesus the Christ.
- 2. A greater sympathy for human beings regardless of their walk of life, who they are, or where they have been or where they are going, sins and all. For anyone saying "No one has hired me, "No one sees my talent," "No one loves me," is a saddening place to be lost. We ought to be attentive to find the nearly forgotten and lost and those on the outer fringes of society.
- 3. The benefit of having a personal relationship with Jesus the Christ because God is Faithful!!
- 4. A Joy and Love so filling that it produces a Happiness that can make a vegetarian BBQ a hamster (Peter Furler Newsboys).

"Because no one hired us" represents a waiting world on life's cliff in front of a chasm impossible to cross without Jesus the Christ. People try to fill the void with materialism, new spiritual movements, cults and some never learn that nothing of this world can fill the emptiness of their heart. It's up to us to seek out the unhired, share the Gospel with them and invite them into the love and Salvation of Jesus the Christ. Reconciliation with God the Father, Salvation in Jesus the Christ, and Counsel of the Holy Spirit is what Christianity uniquely offers this fallen world. Jesus substitutes our sinful life with His Righteous life. In Christ alone our Hope is found! Jesus tells us: (John 14:6) "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." Living, Jesus loves us; Dying, Jesus saves us; Buried, Jesus carries our sins far away; Rising, Jesus justifies us freeing us forever and seals us with the Holy Spirit taking us to a place where sin no longer has the last word in the life of a believer. The Way, the Truth, and the Life is open for business and ready to hire. In accordance with God's time and will for our goodness we will hire our Settled Pastor. And we will labor in the Vineyard with a new Settled Pastor finding a new mission, a new purpose. Fears we face as we journey through this transition will soon find a place to face the God we know. In closing, a reminder from our Search Team: Prayer and Patience.

ChristNet Rotating Shelter Looks to Resume Operation

Soon, far too soon in my opinion, we will be ushering in some much colder weather making the need for homeless shelters all the greater. As most of you are aware, St. Paul has served and supported the Christ Net rotating shelter and program for several decades or better. When the covid pandemic struck the

rotating shelter was halted. Churches began providing and delivering dinner meals to the hotel in which guests were being housed.

After three plus years, ChristNet is hoping to re-open the rotating shelter at the beginning of next year (January). They are canvassing churches to inquire about their interest and availability to participate. Participating churches will be expected to host guests from Sunday to Saturday for a one-week time period. Guests will arrive at the host church in the evening. Upon arrival they will be fed dinner prepared by the host church. Guests will over-night at the church utilizing sleeping bags and blow-up mattresses. In the morning they will be transported by van to the day center where they will receive breakfast and lunch and the opportunity to shower.

If you, or perhaps a group you may be involved with whether inside or outside of the church; book club, scouts, card club, athletic team, etc., would be interested in more information or in assisting with hosting guest please sign the sheet at the Kiosk in Fellowship Hall or in the Narthex. We will need to cover two shifts with a minimum of one male and one female per shift. Additionally, we will need individuals and groups to prepare, serve and clean-up following dinner. 2023 Budget Status

Donations through September of 2023 are still down from last year, we are currently under budget by approximately \$53,000 from our projected income. I am projecting that we will be approximately \$80,000 under our budgeted income of \$322,117 at the end of the year. The good news is that our expenses are approximately \$33,000 under budget. We continue to monitor all budget expenses and purchase only items necessary to maintain the church's business.
