COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S FINAL MESSAGE: 2024

HAPPY NEW YEAR 2024 CONGREGATION! May 2024 Anno Domini, Latin for "in the year of the Lord" be a blessing to you and to the ministry of St. Paul United Church of Christ Taylor, Michigan. May the St. Paul Congregation call and elect a new full time settled pastor in 2024. May the congregation find a new mission that brings outreach to community needs in 2024. May the congregation find a new rallying point around the new full time settled pastor called and elected in a unified way in 2024.

Along with the New Year we have new leadership with Suzanne Mrowka stepping into the role of Council President. Our new Interim Minister Rev. Linda Anderson will provide us pastoral care, worship leadership, and counsel to our Search Team. As we move toward our future the Reinhold Niebuhr's Serenity Prayer will be handed from the outgoing Council President to President – Elect Suzanne Mrowka.

In 1915, Reinhold became an ordained pastor. The German Evangelical Mission Board sent him to serve at Bethel Evangelical Church, 2270 W Grand Blvd, Detroit, Michigan. The congregation numbered 65 on his arrival and grew to nearly 700 members under his leadership. He served as a parish minister in Detroit, Michigan for 13 years. After his ordination, Reinhold attended his first clergy conference in 1915 at St Paul Evangelical Church (St. Paul UCC Taylor today). In the years to follow the Serenity Prayer would come into publication:

God , give me grace to accept with serenity the things that cannot be changed, courage to change the things that should be changed, and the wisdom to know the difference. Living one day at a time, enjoying one moment at a time, accepting hardship as a pathway to peace. Taking, as Jesus did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it, trusting that You will make all things right if I surrender to Your Will, so that I may be reasonably happy in this life and supremely happy with You forever in the next. Amen.

As the congregation continues its transition to everything new in 2024 and beyond, the Serenity Prayer needs to be on our minds now more than ever since the day Reinhold penned those words. Challenges lay ahead, yet they are not insurmountable when we choose to come together in Christ the Lord. Hebrews 10:24-25 challenges us to come together. And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

The Bible teaches us to encourage one another and come together instead of forming factions and divisions that only tear the faithful apart. The Bible instructs us to pray for one another and have the Holy Spirit guide us.

Romans 1:12

...that is, that you and I may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith.

Ephesians 4:32

Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.

1 Thessalonians 5:11

Therefore encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing.

Ephesians 6:18

And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people.

Colossians 1:9

For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you. We continually ask God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all the wisdom and understanding that the Spirit gives,

James 5:16

Therefore, confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective.

May God Bless us in our understanding of these passages by encouraging one another, coming together for one another and praying for one another.

Reflect on Reinhold Niebuhr's Serenity Prayer. Pray for our new leadership on Council. Pray for our Search Team. Pray for the candidates speaking with our Search Team. Pray for our Interim Minister Rev. Linda Anderson to guide us in our transition. Call upon the Holy Spirit to direct each of our paths. Pray to be courageous about the future. Pray for one another and as we pray, may we come together and pray together not only for our membership but for the surrounding community. Pray for the Holy Spirit to guide believers to St. Paul to work together to glorify Jesus the Christ. May the Holy Spirit guide the congregation toward our next mission in electing in a unified way our new full time settled pastor. In the name of Jesus, the Christ, may these prayers be answered in accordance with God's will and the good planned for the St. Paul UCC Taylor congregation in 2024.
