From Rev. Linda

The text messages have been coming with greater frequency in recent days. It is a low and brief beeping noise that the phone makes. Sometimes I hear it, and quickly look to see who is reaching out to me, other times the phone is far enough away that I don't immediately reach for it. In those cases, the message waits. When I do pick up my phone and retrieve the message, it is always urgent.

Blood is needed, and I, with O positive blood, am classified as a universal donor and am regularly being called to come forward and donate a pint. It is usually a simple task, only takes a short time period and is often rewarded with cookies and juice. I have always looked at it as volunteer work where you get to lay back and put your feet up.

They tell us that giving blood saves lives. I know I was blessed with receiving someone else's donated blood when sick and hospitalized some years back. For me, I first donated when I was in college. My roommate had AB type blood and it is considered a rare variety. Once, when I had driven her so she could donate, the nurse looked at me and asked if I was going to simply sit in the waiting room while Maxine donated? You remember the nurses from years back, white stocking, starched white uniform and cap? I remember her voice, and realized I didn't have an option; I started what would become a practice for years to come.

It is Easter. Yes, I know, not specifically Easter day, but the season of Easter for sure. We call out and celebrate Jesus the Christ who gave his blood and his life for each of us. Dying on a cross, he rose and brings for us new life. It is proper and good that we celebrate such a gift. It is the greatest of gifts ever given. Hallelujah! Christ is Risen!! He is Risen indeed!!

Now, what do we do next? Can we keep the celebration alive? I hope so. Easter is always a time to consider new beginnings. It is a time to look at new ways of doing things. It is a time to dedicate and rededicate our lives, individually and collectively, to the Christ who rose for us. The season of Easter is a time of growth. Is the congregation willing to grow? Yes, true, I hear a lot of talk about growing in numbers, and in attendance. But, is the congregation willing to grow spiritually, in faith and practices? That is where church growth begins. Can the congregation grow together as a united church family? It is not necessarily an easy task, but it is one that has great benefits. We should all work toward it, following the love and teachings of Christ.

As followers of Christ, we have much to celebrate. We have much to do as his disciples, carrying on the work that he started. It is not an option.

Let us rejoice, and be glad!

Let us move forward with the joy of Easter and the opportunities of new life.

Church Safety and Security – Emergency Response Team Members

Ensuring the safety of our membership is one of the most important goals of the Safety and Security Ministry. The ministry is looking for interested people who would like to serve on the Emergency Response Team (ERT) for the Church, currently there are 11 people who have volunteered to be on the team, we are looking for about 20-25 people to serve on this important ministry. Roles and responsibilities of an ERT member include: Building evacuations (fire, tornados, electrical outages, etc.), attending semi-annual training, being familiar with all aspects of the buildings, evaluate and eliminate all safety hazards in the building and attend quarterly meetings. If you are interested in serving on the St. Paul Emergency Response Team, please contact Dan Case or any member of the Safety and Security Ministry.

2024 Budget Status

After two months we find ourselves at \$13,384 under budget for our projected income, however our expenses are currently at \$11,983 under budget which is a good thing. We have spent \$10,700 more in the first two months than we took in. Our General Operating Fund, which is the fund we use to pay our bills and salaries, is at \$12,206 beginning the year at \$22,013. If this trend continues the Council will have to make some hard decisions regarding our spending. We continue to monitor all expenses and spend only on those items that are essential to run the church and our programs. If you have any questions please feel free to call me. Safety and Security

For the next couple of months we will be highlighting some safety measures that are in place at the Church to help keep you informed. This month we will be covering **EMERGENCY EVACUATION DRILLS**.

The objectives of an evacuation drills are:

- Give our members and staff an opportunity to practice emergency procedures in a simulated but safe environment.
- Determine if members of the Emergency Response Team understand and can carry out their duties
- Evaluating the effectiveness of our evacuation procedures and determining necessary changes or adjustments to procedures to improve performance
- Complying with local fire codes and insurance company requirements.

If a building evacuation is initiated, for your own safety, **YOU MUST EVACUATE** when asked to do so.

Important "do's and don'ts" are:

- Remain Calm. Proceed as quickly as possible in an orderly manner.
- Follow the instructions of the Emergency Response Team.
- If you occupy an enclosed room, close the door as you leave.
- Take only essential personal items with you. DO NOT return for coats, purses, briefcases, etc., after you have left the building.
- Once out of the building, proceed to the designated assembly area (Green or Red based on the building exit).
- PARENTS, all children in the 2nd Floor Sunday School will be escorted by staff to an assembly area. Children may be picked up from their designated assembly area after the "all clear" signal is given, but not before.
- Do not return to the building until the "all clear" signal is given.

The First Vice-President supports the President in his or her duties as leaders of the Church. After two years of service the First Vice-President assumes the role of President.

- 1. COUNCIL / CABINET
 - a. Attend monthly Council meetings, as scheduled.
 - b. Attend special Council meetings, as scheduled.
 - c. Shall assist the Elders with Communion, as required.
 - d. Attend yearly Council Retreat.

e. Serve as the Council Representative at Church services for a minimum of six services each year. (see Council Representative duties and responsibilities)

- f. Work Coffee Hour or special events when Council has volunteered to host.
- g. Attend the Semi-Annual and Annual meetings
- 2. MEETINGS

a. In the absence of the President, the First-Vice President shall preside over all Council meetings.

b. In the absence of the President, the First-Vice President shall preside over all Congregational meetings.

c. In the absence of the President, the First-Vice President shall preside over all special Congregational meetings.

d. In the absence of the President, the First-Vice President shall preside over all Executive Committee meetings.

- e. The First Vice-President shall preside over all Cabinet meetings.
- 3. FINANCE

a. The First-Vice President is Chairperson of the Budget Ministry.

- 4. SPECIAL
 - a. The First-Vice President shall chair the Annual Church Picnic.
