INTERIM SENIOR PASTOR

We easily speak of things going well, the good life, or being happy. What we often overlook is the sense of joy that is a deep and special feeling. Faith helps us as we seek joy in our daily lives. It provides us with peace and comfort that are hard to explain. I recently read a daily devotion relating to joy that I found very meaningful. Sharing it with you, I hope you will also find it meaningful.

What Is the Source of Your Joy?

Mystic and theologian Howard Thurman (1899–1981) writes of faith as the most secure foundation for joy:

There are some who are dependent upon the mood of others for their happiness.... There are some whose joy is dependent upon circumstances.... There are some who must win their joy against high odds, squeeze it out of the arid ground of their living or wrest it from the stubborn sadness of circumstance.... There are still others who find their joy deep in the heart of their religious experience. It is not related to, dependent upon, or derived from, any circumstances or conditions in the midst of which they must live. It is a joy independent of all vicissitudes. There is a strange quality of awe in their joy, that is but a reflection of the deep calm water of the spirit out of which it comes. It is primarily a discovery of the soul, when God makes known [God's] presence, where there are no words, no outward song, only the Divine Movement. This is the joy that the world cannot give. This is the joy that keeps watch against all the emissaries of sadness of mind and weariness of soul. This is the joy that comforts and is the companion, as we walk even through the valley of the shadow of death.

Catholic priest Henri Nouwen (1932–1996) writes of the joy we experience through the love of God:

Joy is a gift that is there even when we are sorrowful, even when we are in pain, even when things are difficult in our lives. The joy that Jesus offers is a joy that exists in very, very difficult situations....

What we have to start sensing is that in the spiritual life, joy is embracing sorrow and happiness, pain and pleasure. It is deeper, fuller. It is more. It is something that remains with us. It is something of God that is very profound. It is something we can experience even when we are in touch with very painful things in our lives. If there is anything the church wants to teach us it is that the joy of God can be with us always—in moments of sickness, in moments of health, in moments of success, in moments of failure, in moments of birth, in moments of death. The joy of God is never going to leave us....

When we can face our own painful situation, we will discover that hidden in the pain is the treasure—a joy that is there for us to experience here and now. It is very important that we get in touch with this. That is what the spiritual life—the life with God—is about. It is being in touch with that love that becomes joy in us.... Underneath all our fluctuations is a deep solid divine stream that is called joy.

Christian Education

The mission and purpose of Christian Education at St. Paul United Church of Christ is to witness the Gospel of Jesus Christ. With Holy Scripture as our guide and foundation we seek to encourage the whole family to see every phase of church life as giving testimony to our faith. We are committed to providing for all a nurturing environment for learning and fellowship in which the joy of Christian living and the love of Christ are encountered. As part of our Christian Education process we strive to help young and old identify their gifts, callings, and vocations as Christians. We see our Christian Education Program as a place of refuge where we can learn the skills for coping with our problems. We seek to introduce our own Christian family to the larger life and mission of the Christian Church. At the same time, we are committed to promoting tolerance and understanding of other religions of the world. Christian Education is also responsible for Sunday School and Youth Activities and also host the following events each year: Trunk or Treat, Christmas Pageant, Easter Party/Easter Egg Hunt, Donuts for Dad, Advent by Candlelight, Picnic Games, Family Fun Night, host Coffee Hour, and many other smaller activities.

Memorial Ministry

The Memorial Ministry is responsible for managing memorial donations given to the St. Paul Memorial Fund. The Memorial Fund consists of special gifts and legacies to the Church. The money given to the Memorial Fund is to be kept by the Church Treasurer and the funds are to be used in accordance with the decisions of the Memorial Ministry. The Memorial Ministry will use the money with consideration given to the family of the person memorialized and/or giver of the gifts. The Memorial Ministry holds sole authority over the Memorial Fund and It shall be separate from the Generational Endowment Fund. Items purchased by the Memorial Ministry include: donation to steeple repair, new Bunn coffee pot for parlor, new sewing table for Sew n' Sew group, choir robes, hearing aid system for sanctuary, tables for Sunday School, Memorial Cremation Garden, chairs for Fellowship Hall and many more items.

2025 Budget Status - Thank You for your Continued Support

I will continue to report only our actual income and expenses for the remainder of 2025. Our actual income for August was \$23,637.00 and our actual expenses for August were \$14,252,63, a difference of \$9,284.37 which was a positive balance for the month. We are currently only \$4,113.91 negative for the year, an improvement of about \$9,000 from July. Our General Fund, which is the fund we use to pay our expenses (salaries, utilities, etc) is at \$27,476.18 an increase of \$8,784.37 from July. These are definitely positive trends from last month. October is National Church Safety and Security Month

National Church Safety and Security Month is a time for heightening awareness on preventing fires and injuries and reviewing ways to be secure in our worship setting. St. Paul Safety and Security Ministry meets on a regular basis and reviews church policies with regards to providing a safe environment in which to worship. You can identify members of your Emergency Response Team (ERT) by the yellow and red arm bands or red badges hanging around their necks that they wear during St. Paul services and at our larger events. If you are interested in joining the ERT or becoming a member of the Safety and Security Ministry please contact Dan Case.

Active Shooter Procedures

With the recent incidents occurring in schools and churches in the past several months the Safety and Security Ministry thought that it would be appropriate to include our current procedures with regards to an active shooter event at our church. We plan on holding an active shooter training session in November, date TBD, for St. Paul members.

ACTIVE SHOOTER EMERGENCY

ACTION PLAN

An Active Shooter is an individual actively engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a confined and populated area; in most cases, active shooters use firearm(s) and there is no pattern or method to their selection of victims.

Active Shooter situations are unpredictable and evolve quickly. Typically, the immediate deployment of law enforcement is required to stop the shooting and mitigate harm to victims.

Because active shooter situations are often over within minutes, before law enforcement arrives on the scene, St. Paul staff and members must be prepared both mentally and physically to deal with an active shooter situation. Time is a critical factor in the management of a situation of this magnitude.

HOW TO RESPOND

RUN/HIDE/FIGHT

Evacuate/Run

If there is an accessible escape path, attempt to evacuate the building.

Be sure to:

- Have an escape route and plan in mind.
- Evacuate regardless of whether others agree to follow.
- Leave your belongings behind.
- Help others escape, if possible.
- Prevent others from entering an area where the active shooter may be.
- Keep your hands visible when law enforcement arrives on scene.
- Follow the instructions of any police officers.
- Do not attempt to move wounded people.
- Call 911 when you are safe. If possible, give the 911 operator, the location of the shooter, number of shooters, physical description, number and type of weapon, number of potential victims.

Lockdown"HIDE OUT"

If evacuation is not possible, find a place to hide where the active shooter is less likely to find you.

Your hiding place should:

- 1. Be out of the active shooter's view
- 2. Provide protection if shots are fired in your direction (i.e., an office with a closed and locked door)
- 3. Not trap you or restrict your options for movement
- 4. To prevent an active shooter from entering your hiding place: Lock the door, blockade the door with heavy furniture, cover the window with covering material.

If the active shooter is nearby:

- 1. Lock the door
- 2. Silence your cell phone and/or pager
- 3. Turn off any source of noise (i.e., radios, televisions)
- 4. Hide behind large items (i.e., cabinets, desks)
- 5. Remain quiet
- 6. If evacuation and hiding out are not possible:
 - o Remain calm
 - o Dial 911, if possible, to alert police to the active shooter's location
 - o If you cannot speak, leave the line open and allow the dispatcher to listen

Remain in place until found by a uniformed law enforcement officer.

Take Action against the Active Shooter/Fight

AS A LAST RESORT, and only when your life is in imminent danger, attempt to disrupt and/or incapacitate the active shooter by:

- Acting as aggressively as possible against him/her
- Throwing items and improvising weapons
- Yelling
- Committing to your actions

NOTE: These types of situations will generate a lot of media attention. All media communications and inquiries will be made by the Active President or designated spokesperson.
